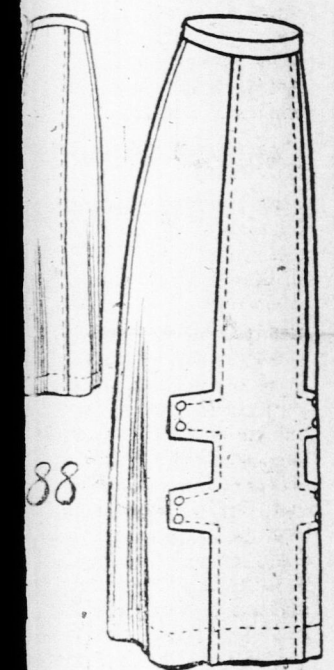

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, July 15. The Daily News, the principal ministerial organ, to-day, in an editorial on the Panama Canal Bill, says that apparently the United States Senate means to pass the Bill without heeding the British Government's protest; adding that the Senators, perhaps, think the Bill in its present form makes no distinction. Continuing, it says, the Bill is certainly obscure enough to stand divers interpretations, but that, however, is not a satisfactory attitude. If Senators do not wish to discriminate, they ought to make their intentions as clear in the Bill as possible. Probably they think Congress has a right to discriminate under the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty. That is not the British view, the News goes on to say, and thus we have a conflict of opinion as to the meaning of the international agreement. There is only one way to dispose of this conflict, and that by arbitration. Neither America nor Britain wishes to violate any engagements of both countries, but on the other hand are anxious to carry out such agreements in spirit and in letter. When there is a difference of opinion as to the true character, the obvious solution is to submit the issue to an impartial judge; and that course should be taken if the Bill, as it leaves Congress, turns out to be in conflict with the British view bearing on the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty.

LONDON, July 15. The King after inspecting a detachment of the Ancient and Honourable Artillery Company of Boston, now on a visit here, and the Honourable Artillery Company of London, at Buckingham Palace, this morning, advanced to the center of the hollow square, formed by the companies, and, addressing the men, said: "I am particularly pleased to welcome the representatives of the old Massachusetts regiment, and I hope they will derive much pleasure from their trip." At the conclusion of the inspection the King was photographed with the Artillerymen and Whitelaw Reid, the American ambassador.

LONDON, July 15. For the first time since the Dockers' strike was declared nine weeks ago, the troops were called out to-day to preserve order. The strikers, many thousands of whom, with their families, are on the verge of starvation in the East End of London are apparently to the point of desperation, and the authorities, who have been advised of the situation, in order to prevent bloody reprisals on the non-unionist workers, who have taken the places of the strikers, this morning ordered several companies of the Irish Guards to march into the disturbed districts.

LIVERPOOL, July 15. Upwards of 12,000 men engaged in the Liverpool docks have been brought out already by malcontents who went to the docks in crowds. At Birkenhead, shipping is all held up and the situation is serious. The men's leaders insist that the strikers will not accept the Clearing House System under any circumstances.

WASHINGTON, July 15. The Panama Canal Bill, against which Britain has filed a protest, was to-day taken up by the Senate. A request to lay it aside temporarily met with objection from Senator Bradege, Chairman of the Senatorial Committee, who announced his intention to push the consideration of the bill. Consideration of the Bill was insisted on.

DENVER, Col., July 15. Several hundred men, women and children are homeless, a number of deaths is reported, and \$1,500,000 of property losses, as the result of a cloud burst, which resulted in the overflow of the shallow bed of Cherry Creek through this city.
