### New Waterford Aliens in Riot.

#### Dominion Officer Stabbed Six Times During Sunday Melee—Victim in Hospital.

Official news posted at New Waterford this morning says that Sunday night an engagement took place at Scotchtown, a nearby settlement, between a force of Germans and district police, as a result of which Percy Morris, a Dominion constable, is in emergency hospital at New Waterford suffering from six knife wounds, none of which are, however, serious.

Some two dozen German men and women had foregathered at a place of meeting in Scotchtown where beer, sausages and dancing were the order of the day. As the evening lengthened the Germans became hilarious and a band of police were despatched to restore order. The arrival of the blue-coats precipitated a fight, and during the melee knives were used and Percy Morris received a carving in approved German style.

Two of the rioters were landed in jail, including Joseph Schrage, leader of the aliens. Up to some time ago these German men and women, met at New Waterford where they held orgies. They were forced out of town and established quarters at Scotchtown.

Coun. D. H. McLean says he complained to Mr. Noble, Police Agent, to have the aliens rounded up and driven out of the town, but Mr. McLean says nothing was done. Schrage and his compatriot will be arraigned before Stipendiary Hean to-day.

It is a fact that these orgies have become more prevalent since the commencement of the war, and it appears, when the Teutons were gathered in the seclusion of their own society, some pretty dangerous talk would be uttered. One man, a sort of leader of the crowd, is credited with haranguing the assemblies with such vituperative and inciting language that the wonder is that he has not been put under restraint or arrested for breaking his parole long ago—Sydney Post, May 3.

### Willard's Victory Worth Half a Million.

#### First Year of Triumphant Tour Ought to Make \$300,000; John L. Sullivan's Trip Worth \$187,000.

Jess Willard's victory is worth approximately half a million dollars to him in the next two years!

John L. Sullivan, the greatest money-making prize fighter has ever known, never equalled that regardless of the oft-told tales of the millions he spent. Just before the Johnson-Jeffries battle Sullivan said: "Johnson or Jeffries stand to win \$250,000. Why, all my fights together didn't come to that."

Corbett never reached that amount. Fitzsimmons or Jeffries didn't and outside of the \$135,000 or so that he pulled out of the Jeffries battle (his share of the \$101,000 purse and the moving pictures), Johnson hasn't averaged as well as any one of half a dozen lightweight.

How is Willard going to get it? Why, the stage, of course.

Willard is worth approximately \$7,500, nearly \$1,000 for each appearance as a vaudeville attraction for at least half a year. Then he can drop to \$3,000 or \$4,000 a week and finish the year. He could go on for another year for lesser money, taking on all comers, as did John L. Sullivan.

But at the end of a year Willard will undoubtedly start mixing up the vaudeville engagements with ten-round fights in the large cities where boxing is permitted. Any one of these can easily be made worth \$10,000 to \$25,000 to him, depending on the class of his opponent.

Here's the way Willard's income will pile up in the next two years:

We'll figure he made about \$50,000 on the fight, which is probably nearer the truth than many of the reports. Then 26 weeks of \$7,500 vaudeville means \$195,000. The last half, 26 weeks of \$4,000 vaudeville is \$104,000. That disposes of the first year.

In the second year he may be guessed that Willard can average \$15,000 a piece for eight 10-round easy fights, with nothing at stake so far as his right to be called champion is concerned. This adds \$120,000. Between the second year he could sandwich in \$50,000 worth of vaudeville work.

This makes his total income for the two years over which he could spread his triumphal tour before it would even be suggested that he fight a championship battle with a challenger, approximately \$519,000—the greatest amount ever made by a pugilist and perhaps greater than ever will be made again.

Perhaps this earning capacity is overestimated. If it is it may be balanced by saying that this is all the money Willard will ever make as champion, as his income would certainly drop off to a comparatively small amount after the first two years. Then Willard, at 27 years of age and by no means the best white heavyweight that the world has ever known. If he can hold his title up to the age of 35 years, he will be doing wonderfully well.

John L. Sullivan's triumphal tour, the most profitable on record, brought in \$187,000, and expenses were \$45,000. A large part of the latter amount was spent quenching John L.'s thirst, according to his own story.

### What Happens to Unexploded Bombs?

In the war museum in Paris there is a very big collection of German grenades, air bombs, and explosive shells which have not exploded.

It is one of the tasks of the staff of the museum to deal with these bombs, and it is naturally a task full of difficulty and danger.

Recently, for example, one of the Zeppelin bombs thrown on Paris was discovered by a fireman half-buried in the ground and still intact, though the time fuse had been set. This bomb was removed by the war museum staff and after the fuse had been unscrewed the explosive contents, weighing some forty pounds, were carefully taken out.

One of the most dangerous tasks the museum authorities had to handle was the removal of the explosive from an unexploded 42 centimetre German shell which had been fired at one of the forts of Verdun.

The military engineers who undertook the job built up a mass of plaster of Paris all round the shell so as to hold it firmly in position, and then a small electric motor was attached to the fuse piece, and set so as to unscrew it. The engineers watched the unscrewing of the fuse from a safe distance. Once the fuse was removed, however, it was easy to empty the huge shell of its explosives and render it harmless.

### WE GET MUCH WAR STUFF FROM AMERICA!

One of the things the Germans have been grumbling about is the amount of things needed for the war that the Allies have had from America. Few people, indeed, realize what vast quantities of goods the Americans have sent over to us.

First of all the entire output of the United States in high explosives has been bought up by the Allies for months to come. One firm alone, the General Electric Company, has received orders from the British Government for 40,000,000 lb. of T. N. T., and 20,000,000 lb. of gun cotton!

The United States have had orders for 300,000,000 rounds of rifle ammunition, seven and a half million shrapnel shells, seventy thousand armour-piercing projectiles, and a million rifles!

Add to that two million uniforms, a million blankets, half a million pairs of socks, over four million yards of khaki, and half a million tons of barbed wire, and it will be realised that America is a big war factory!

Up to the end of February 1st, in fact over £30,000,000 worth of war goods have been shipped to England and France alone.

#### NEW USE FOR MOLASSES.

Berlin, via London, April 24.—Herr Steffens, a German inventor, has applied for letters of patent for the making of lubricating oil from molasses. He announces that exhaustive tests of the output of his process have given satisfactory results. Herr Steffens' investigations into the manufacture of lubricating oil were due to the war, which interrupted the customary supply from Russia and the United States.
