Memorial Day Parade.

OFFICIAL PROGRAMME—GOVERNOR WILL UNVEIL SERGEANTS' MEMORIAL.

The Memorial Parade planned for tomorrow promises to be one of the most memorable one in the history of the country. Under the capable administration of the Executive of the G.W.V. A. all arrangements have been carefully made and the official programme, which is appended, should be carried through without a hitch.

8.45 a.m.—War Veterans (with or without uniforms), Nurses, V.A.D's, etc., Brigades, Old Comrades and Boy Scouts are asked to parade on Prince's Rink Parade Grounds, as follows:

- (a) Detachment H.M.S. Briton.
- (b) C.I.B. Cadets Band, Church of England War Veterans, Church Ladies' Brigade, C.I.B. Old Comrades.
- (c) Nurses, V.A.D's, etc.
- (d) C.C.C. Band, Roman Catholic War Veterans, Catholic Cadet Corps, C.C.C. Old Comrades.
- (e) Newfoundland Highlanders' Pipers; Presbyterian War Veterans; Congregational War Veterans; Newfoundland Highlanders.
- (f) Methodist Guards Band; Methodist War Veterans; M.G.B. Old Comrades.
- (g) No. 1 S.A. Silver Band; S.A. War Veterans.

10.15 a.m.—The whole of the above march to the square opposite Synod Hall and various churches, via Governor Street.

10.30 a.m.—Memorial Service in city churches, C. of E. Cathedral, St. Thomas's, Gower St. Church and Presbyterian Church.

11.00 a.m.—R. C. Cathedral.

12.00 noon.—(1) War Veterans form up in line facing south with flank resting on western end of Queen's Rd. (2) Brigades, Old Comrades, Nurses V.A.D's and deputations from Societies move to the enclosures allocated them.

12.05 p.m.—Colour Party with Battalion Colours move on parade.

12.10 p.m.—The whole move forward and align on positions allocated to them.

12.15 p.m.—His Excellency the Governor and party arrive and are received by the G.W.V.A. Executive and Sergeant's Committee.

12.30 p.m.—His Excellency Sir C. Alexander Harris, K.C.M.G., C.B., C.V.O., unveils Memorial erected by the Sergeants of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment to the Memory of the Officers and Men of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment who made the Supreme Sacrifice in the Great War.

12.35 p.m.—The C.I.B.C. Band will play two verses of "Nearer My God to Thee"; all are asked to join in the singing. Sergeants place their wreath on Memorial.

Firing Party will fire a volley.

12.50 p.m.—Bands will play "Dead March in Sani" and "The Lament," while wreaths are placed on the Memorial.

12.40 p.m.—His Excellency delivers The Panegyric.

12.55 p.m.—"Last Post" by massed Bugles.

1.00 p.m.—"Hallelujah Chorus," and "Regimental March" of the Royal Nfld. Regiment.

1.10 p.m.—General Salute. War Veterans and Brigades reform and march to Government House. Colour Party move off parade. War Veterans dismissed and Brigades move off to respective headquarters for dismissal.
