United States Sealing Steamer.

MAY CLEAR FROM ST. JOHN'S. When Mr. J. T. Meaney was in New York recently, he endeavoured, through the good offices of another Newfoundland, to interest American capital in the production of the seal-fishery. To such good purpose was his suggestion accepted that yesterday he received cable advice that a steamer of 1700 tons net, would sail from New York, and would likely reach St. John's in time to engage in the seal-fishery this season.

Plane Leaves To-Morrow.

NO PASSENGERS GOING. The Martynside aeroplane will leave for Botwood to-morrow, from which centre, the aerial survey of the icefields will be conducted. No passengers will be taken, but it is possible that a special trip may be made to St. George for the purpose of bringing Messrs. Archibald and Barnes, the members for the district, to that town. Pressure of other business prevents Major Cotton from taking passengers to various outposts as was at first intended.

Line Not Yet Clear.

EXPRESS FOR MILLERTOWN JUNCTION TO-MORROW. The work of clearing the railway line is still continuing and by to-morrow, an express will be able to be run as far as Millertown Junction. The Rotary plows are at work on the section of the line between Gooibies and Arnold's Cove. This is the only section of the main line not yet clear.

ICE THROWS SCUR. ON SHOAL. Whilst the tug Hero was towing the schooner Harriet out of port this morning, a rather unusual accident occurred, and but for good management on the part of all concerned, both vessel and tug would have been badly damaged.

Sagona for Icefields.

The Sagona will go to the ice-fields again this year, and will take about the same complement of men as last season. The ship is now practically ready and very little remains to be done to fit her out for the sealing voyage, beyond bunkering her. The ship was sent to the assistance of the "sisto" this morning.

Belle Isle Report.

A message to the Marine and Fisheries Department from the wireless station at Belle Isle states that no sign of seals have as yet been seen. The winds during January and February were mostly west to north. Westerly winds, blowing a strong breeze with close packed local ice were the conditions prevailing when the message was sent yesterday.

SYDNEY, Australia, Feb. 20. It was reported here to-day that plans are maturing for a world-wide co-operative wheat marketing organization, which will eventually control Canadian, United States and Australian crops.

CATTLE DISEASE UNDER CONTROL.

LONDON, Feb. 20. The Right Hon. Sir A. Griffith Boscawen replying to a question asked in the House to-day, said the result of foot and mouth disease in the United Kingdom had been the slaughtering of 17,037 cattle, this number having been authorized to be killed up till yesterday.

THE POSSIBILITIES OF WIRELESS.

TORONTO, Feb. 20. Addressing the Canadian Club here to-day, A. H. Morse, General Manager of the Marconi Co., said he would be greatly disappointed if within two years there were not direct wireless services between Montreal and London, and between Vancouver, B.C. and Melbourne, Australia.

Liquor Rationing System.

HOW SWEDEN RESTRICTS SALE, BUT PERMITS ALL TO BUY. Stockholm (Associated Press)—The consumption of the intoxicating liquor in Sweden has been reduced nearly 50 per cent, since the beginning of 1914, when Sweden's liquor rationing system went into effect.

DUBLIN, Feb. 21. The strength of the new Provisional Government's support among the Sinn Fein clubs of Ireland is expected to be clearly defined by Ard Fheis, the National Sinn Fein Convention, which opened here to-day.

COLOR FIGHT CONTINUING.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Feb. 2. Kingston was still in a state of excitement last night over continued attacks by West Indian negro soldiers against police and property.

TWENTY SIX UNIONISTS HELD.

BELFAST, Feb. 21. While the great bulk of Unionists, captured in recent raids in Northern Ireland, have been released, the Ulster Home Office announced to-day that twenty six of the kidnapped men had not yet been returned.

PREFERS TO BE COMMONER.

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 21. All offers of special honors, that have been tendered to him for his work as head of the British Delegation at the Washington Armaments Conference, have been rejected by Right Hon. Arthur J. Balfour, says a Mail and Empire cable.
