New prices of course have not been fixed, and to some extent they will be influenced by what happens in Newfoundland. At present we notice that Newfoundland is quoting merchantable stock suitable for European markets at \$6.50 ex-vessel. These fish are higher quality and dried than our Lunenburg fish, and therefore really more money but on the other hand, they are not as well liked in some of the West Indian consuming markets, so it is difficult to say at the moment to what extent they will affect values here. We hear \$7.00 talked of values here. We hear \$7.00 talked of as a probable price for the new Lun-

enburg catch.

Market conditions abroad are quite bright from our standpoint at the present time. Forto Rico has entirely present time. Forto Rico has entirely recovered from its slump, and is now returning about \$8.00 per quintal to local shippers. Of course Porto Rico is a consignment market, and it is hard to form any estimate from week to week as to what it is likely to do; prices go up or down, according as supplies decrease or increase. In Cuba the demand for dried fish is avecilent as it is also in Jewales. excellent, as it is also in Jamaica, Trindad and the other West India Izlands. The European news is not quite so good. To some extent this is due to interference by the Portuguese Government. Newfoundland had been sending quite a good deal of fish to Oporto of late, but recently fish to Oporto of late, but recently shippers were advised by order of the Portuguese Government that the payment for same had to be deposited in the Oporto banks until the Government would issue a permit that the amount so deposited could be sent out of the country. The effect of course of this wil be that Oporto will get no more fish, or at least not until she devises some way of paying for them which will be satisfactory to the shippers. Italy is in the market today for a contribute. satisfactory to the shippers. Italy is in the market to-day for a certain quantity of codfish for prompt shipment, and is willing to pay about last year's prices. No doubt Newfoundland will be after this business. It does not interest us very much here because we have little supplies suitable for that market at the present time.—Maritime Merchant.
