

SOUTH RIDING OF WELLINGTON.

MEETING OF REFORMERS.

A meeting of the members of the Reform Party of the South Riding of the County of Wellington, will be held at the

TOWN HALL, GUELPH.

On Tuesday, 9th day of July,

Dr. Orton's Mode of Canvassing

After the regular business of the Centre Riding Reform Convention—which met at Elora on Tuesday—was finished, Mr. James Anderson, of Garafraxa, rose, and intimated that he would like to say a few words.

He had a letter in his possession, which he had received from Dr. Orton, and would read it. He supposed that when the wily doctor was penning it he little thought that it would be made so public. Because he voted for Mr. Ferrier, through personal friendship, the doctor need not imagine that he was going to support him.

The Government which the doctor had been brought out to support had so often acted wrongly, and so glaringly inconsistent, that he could not, and would not, support one of its minions. The letter was handed to the chairman, which was handed back to the recipient, who read it as follows:

Windsor Camp, June 29th, 1872.

DEAR SIR: Being a candidate at the approaching election for the Dominion Parliament, I take the liberty of addressing you, to solicit your support, feeling that my views, as soon as made public, on the affairs of our country, will meet with your approval, which I hope to be shortly able to lay before the electors.

From the above very obsequious epistle any one can see that the Doctor is bound to use every means in his power to carry the election in the Centre Riding. He is not by any means diffident, and we must say in sending the above letter to a Reformer the Doctor shows a considerable amount of cheek.

No doubt he thought that any little attention he might show to Mr. Anderson would so overcome his scruples that he might be induced to give the Doctor his vote.

But Mr. Anderson is not made of such stuff as to be influenced by a soft-sawdaring letter. And he is more over a good type of the staunch Reformers in the Centre Riding, who will stand by their principles and their nominee in spite of all the flattery that may be heaped on them by Dr. Orton or his Tory friends to induce them to forsake their party.

Let the Doctor attend to the Conservatives—and he will have work enough to keep them right—the Reformers will take care of themselves.

Political Appointments.

Col. Gray has been appointed Judge of the Supreme Court of British Columbia, for which place he will shortly leave, to enter on his duties.

So the great codifier and mileage man has been shelved at last.

Mr. J. O'Connor M. P. for Essex, has been sworn in as President of the Council.

Capt. Cameron, who "blawsted" the fences in Manitoba as such a rate during the rebellion there, has been appointed one of the Commissioners for surveying and marking out the line of boundary between the British and American territories, from the Lake of the Woods to the Rocky Mountains. The "blawsted" Cameron is son-in-law to Dr. Tupper.

Hon. Edward Blake leaves for England to-day by one of the Allan steamers.

Several outrages are reported in Ireland. A murder has been committed in Monaghan, and at Longford a woman named Macaulay poured molten lead into her husband's ear with the intention of murdering him.

LATE English advices say that the decision of the Privy Council of the Anglican Church in the appeal case of Rev. Mr. Bennet, Vicar of Frome, has created great interest. His decision declares that the doctrine of the real presence in the Eucharist is true, and not a Romish error. Rev. Mr. Bennet has taught this doctrine and his conduct is sustained. Trouble is predicted in the Church from this decision.

The Court of Arbitration at Geneva, is to consider, first, the character of the confederate cruisers; and, secondly, as dependent on this, England's responsibility or irresponsibility for their depredations; and, thirdly, the award of damages in case of her culpability in the matter, either in a lump sum or in detail. If the latter the Board will close its labors and hand over the case to the Assessor provided by the treaty.

There is no longer any doubt that the nominees of the Cincinnati Convention will be endorsed by the regular Democratic Convention at Baltimore. The World, which has op-

posed Mr. Greeley bitterly, concedes everything, and is preparing to support him. We believe there is not a prominent Democratic paper in the United States which now opposes him, except the Chicago Times, and all the influence which that paper possesses will not hurt anybody very badly.

The Boston Jubilee.

Boston, July 3.—The concert this afternoon was listened to by a very large audience. Mrs. F. M. Smith, Boston, sang Guglielmi's "Gratias Agamus Tibi," to the clarinet of Mr. Thomas Ryan, with justice to its author, and was complimented by an encore. Mr. Rossick, of the Berlin Quartette, gave a fine execution of his accomplishment upon the cornet, and the English band performed Vivian's processional march, "The Silver Trumpets," as played at St. Peter's, in Rome, with splendid effect on the audience. The Guelph Republican band will celebrate the 4th of July by a dance at DeGham, on the invitation of Louis Leche, a French resident. They will give six concerts in New York, three in Philadelphia, and will possibly visit Chicago before returning to Europe.

Horace Greeley was escorted to the press-room by Alderman Jenks previous to the concert, and introduced to the ladies and gentlemen representatives of the press. Afterwards on entering the vast auditorium, great enthusiasm was manifested by the people, those in the parquet rising to greet him, and those in the balconies waving their handkerchiefs. Cheers were given, and a few minutes elapsed before the programme could be resumed.

There were 845 deaths in New York during the four days ending on Wednesday.

Two men were killed by lightning at Louisville on Wednesday.

A fire at East Saginaw, on Wednesday, destroyed property to the amount of \$35,000.

The Spanish Republicans are becoming utterly radical, rejecting all compromise with monarchy.

The English cricketers sail from Liverpool on Thursday, 8th August, and will play at Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, London, and Hamilton in the order named.

A Dr. Decaise has communicated to the French Academy of Medicine the fact that the proportion of births to marriages in France is so very small that it would be impossible to raise recruits enough to avenge Sedan!

The treaty providing for the evacuation of French territory by the German troops has been signed.

On the 5th ult., free public reading-rooms on the principle of the British Workman public house, were opened at 46 Cathcart street, Greenock. The rooms are six in number, and are provided with periodicals, newspapers, &c. This is the first institution of the kind in Scotland.

The trials in Paris by court-martial of the woman Clariot, who gained notoriety during the reign of the Commune by murdering a gendarme, and of the man Phillips, who was a prominent member of the Commune, and participated in many of its most disgraceful acts, have just terminated. Both were convicted of the charges preferred against them, and sentenced to be executed.
