According to well authenticated reports of the plans of the British war department, it is understood that the secretary of war will disclose in his forthcoming army estimate as one of the prinicpal measures of economy a proposal to abolish the famous scarlet full-dress uniform of all the infantry of the lines, the royal marines and the light infantry.
