—Prof. James W. Robertson, of the Ex-
perimental Farm, Ottawa, is in the city.
—J. McCready is station-master while

—The many friends of Mrs. C. A. King-
ston will be sorry to hear of her serious ill-
ness.
—Six fountains for the use of man and
beast will be erected on the streets im-
mediately.
—Prof. Hand, of Hamilton, will give a
display of fireworks at the Western Fair
this year.
—Miss Nettie McLeod, of Horton street,
is visiting Miss Maude Bryanton, at Port
Stanley.
—Rev. Dr. Franklin, of Lansdowne Col-
lege, Portage la Prairie, is visiting friends
in this city.
—Mrs. Charles Goodhue, of South Lon-
don, fractured her arm this week as the re-
sult of a runaway accident.

police magistrate yesterday with taking
the employer's horse, and thereby causing
him expense. He was fined \$2 or one
week.

—Joe Coombs was again at the Police
Court yesterday on a charge of vagrancy.
He promised to leave town at once and
never return if let go. Sentence was sus-
pended.

—J. Knowles, Alex. Milne, J. Milne,
Chas. Ellis, J. A. Tane, Corbin Veld and
Chas. Brown of the Forest City Bicycle
Club, left yesterday to attend the L. A. W.
meet in Detroit.

—Norman, the young son of Mrs. Mason,
Horton street, fell from a cherry tree, a
distance of twenty feet, Wednesday after-
noon at Mrs. E. Wright's, Craig street, and
fractured both bones of the forearm. Dr.
Ferguson reduced the fracture, and thinks
the lad suffered no internal injuries.

—Nicholas Hendricks, the crippled but
combative man, who was allowed a
chance to go home Thursday, was again in
the Police Court yesterday on the old
charge of vagrancy. He managed to gather
up a little money by begging Thursday and
will make use of it to-day in getting out of
the city.

—The breach of the market bylaw case,
in which James Guymer is defendant was
again brought up at the Police Court yester-
day. Judgment was reserved for
eight days, during which time the opinion of
No. 3 Committee of the Council will be
obtained. The latter has referred the mat-
ter to the solicitor.

—George Benson, of R. S. Williams &
Co., this city, and Miss May Cady, of
Swaburg, were united in marriage at the
latter's home on Wednesday evening. Miss
Mary Doyle acted as bridesmaid and W.
Cody, of Swaburg, as groomsmen. Rev.
H. C. Speller, of Adelaide Street Baptist
Church, performed the interesting cere-
mony. The presents were both useful and
valuable, betokening the high esteem in
which the young pair are held. Their
future home will be on Wellington street.
A. Clark and E. J. Fowling, of this city,
were among the Londoners who were pre-
sent at the happy affair.

—In the High Court case of O'Callaghan
vs. O'Callaghan, A. D. Cameron yester-
day applied to Judge Muir for an order ap-
pointing a commission to take the evidence
of an important witness, John Ryckman, of
Thorold. The case is a peculiarly involved
one. Thomas O'Callaghan, of London, has
possession of some property on James and
Stuart streets which is claimed by the
widow of John O'Callaghan, who claimed
to have inherited it as Dennis O'Callaghan's
heir. In a recent suit to recover possession
Mrs. John O'Callaghan failed to prove her
title, as the registered deed was in the name
of Pat McCann. The deed from McCann
to Dennis O'Callaghan has since turned up
in a registered will, and Ryckman is the
sole surviving witness to it. He is a hale
and hearty old man of 94 years, and was
formerly a magistrate of Hamilton when it
was but a very small town. The order was
granted. (Hamilton Herald.)

Five more tramps were arrested this
morning for trespassing. They came in on

in the yard when discovered. The assen-
sities were notified and lodged them in the

The Board of Works.
No. 2 Committee of the City Council met
Thursday evening. Presents Aldermen Cor-
nor (chairman), O'Meara, Winnett, Bart-
lett, Shaw and Acting Engineer Graydon.
Mr. Cor's chair for \$50 on account of ac-
cident to Mrs. Cox on English street bridge
was referred to engineer and chairman to
settle. A communication from the City
Gas Company respecting the removal of
their pipes was referred to the engineer. A
letter from A. Smith asked for a stone
sidewalk at Ross' Hotel, corner of Dundas
and Egerton streets. It was decided to al-
low him to put down the walk, and the
Council will consider paying the cost
third after the walk is finished. A
communication received from Acting En-
gineer Graydon complaining of the
wretched state of the sidewalks on both
sides of Queen's Avenue between Park
avenue and Wellington street, and also on
east side of Rectory street from G. T. R. to
Hamilton road will be referred to the
Council. The engineer was instructed to
notify the man who took the contract for
cutting the grass and weeds on Queen's
Park that if the weeds are not cut at once
some person will be hired to do the
work at his expense. The engineer will
prepare an estimate and call for tenders for
cutting the grass and weeds on Queen's

Wm. Anthistle, \$30 10; C. Beckett, \$300;
Morris Inwood, \$100; Joseph Rogers, \$150.
