THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

Toronto, Oct. 4-11 p.m.—Since Saturday the depression has moved slowly from Michigan to Ontario, with somewhat increasing energy. The warm weather has continued from Ontario eastward to Nova Scotia, but the cold wave is slowly advancing across the middle of the lake region. Rain is now falling over the greater part of Ontario, and the weather is fair in the other Provinces. Cautionary signals are displayed at lake ports.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 20°-28°; Prince Albert, 20°-34°; Qu'Appelle, 28°-35°; Winnipeg, 36°-41°; Toronto, 61°-67°; Montreal, 60°-72°; Quebec, 64°-72°; Halifax, 51°-70°.

Toronto, Oct. 5-11 a.m.—The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lake region covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville are West to north winds; decidedly cooler; mostly cloudy and showery.

—Bishop Baldwin confirmed 37 candidates in Trinity Church on Wednesday evening. His addresses, before and after the ceremony were full of Christian advice.

—W. Y. Branton & Son sold about 50,000 pounds of sugar for the underwriters at the Grand Trunk freight sheds Friday. A. M. Smith bought it at 24 cents a pound, as it had been slightly damaged.

—H. M. Burrows, of Vancouver, B. C., eldest son of the late Hannibal Burrows, of this city, was married on Sept. 23 to Miss Maud Marion, eldest daughter of the late Dr. Black, of New Westminster, B. C.

The regular meeting of London West School Board should have taken place Friday evening, but not enough members turned out to form a quorum, and those present went home without transacting any business.

—Wm. F. Cannon, writing from Portland, Me., says: "The coming season Mr. James O'Neill will present 'Monte Cristo,' 'The Sign of the Cross' and 'The Sign of the Cross'."

—About a dozen employees of the Bell Telephone Company are engaged in constructing a new line to Springbank. The poles now in use are being replaced by larger and heavier ones. Frank Whiting is overseer of the work.

—The London Fair this year was the best ever held, far eclipsing any former exhibitions in that city. This exhibition is improving year by year, and the day is not far distant when it will be as much sought after as the Toronto Industrial.

—The Salvation Army had a big jubilee and banquet on Tuesday and Wednesday. Brigadier Spooner and wife, from London, were present, the latter being instructed directly by Mrs. Booth. Other officers and soldiers were present and a big time enjoyed.

—James McFadden, constable, of Clarendon, was arraigned before Judge Elliot Saturday on a charge of not allowing Elizabeth Taylor sufficient time to properly clothe her infant child to the detriment of her on a charge of larceny. The judge considered that there was no evidence whatever against Mr. McFadden and dismissed the case. Elizabeth Taylor will be tried for manslaughter at the assizes because of her child's death.

—Detroit, Toronto, Hamilton, Stratford, Sarnia, and other leading cycling clubs have announced their intention of entering the team races at the big meeting of the day and night of larceny. Wright; reading, Miss L. McLeod; anthem, by the choir. After the programme refreshments were served, to which the young people did ample justice.

—Rev. Dr. W. S. Rainsford, rector of St. George's Church, New York, formerly of this city, has returned from his vacation trip. He has been absent since July 22.

To a reporter he spoke of his stay abroad as having been most pleasant. He is looking forward to a continuation of church and mission work on the same as at home—vigorous and liberal. Regarding his position on certain church questions he asked to be excused from any expressions. "It would do no good at the present time," said he. "Be assured my mind is not changed. Nor can the church take any steps against me; that is something to which I have not made myself liable."

Half a Mile Outward.

Instructions have been given to station agents, road masters, section men and men of railroads generally to thoroughly carry out the Ontario laws regarding cattle running at large, and that is to impound every cow, horse, sheep or pig found running at large within one half mile of any crossing in city, town, village or country, and to prosecute the owners thereof where they persist in violating the law.

The preliminary examination in connection with the East Middlesex Dominion election protest was conducted Saturday at Col. Macbeth's office in the Court House.

Joseph Marshall, M.P., the defendant, was not present.

The play is not new to Philadelphia, but it never fails to draw, mainly because of the excellence of W. H. Power's company."

The Jewish New Year.

Friday night marked the beginning of the Jewish new year, and the occasion has been appropriately observed by the local Israelites. A correspondent, speaking of the coming Jewish festival, says: "Rosh Hashanah is strictly observed all over the Jewish world among the Hebrews, according to the Scriptures, on the first day of the seventh month of October, corresponding to the month of October: 'Speak unto the children of Israel, saying, in the seventh month, on the first day of the month, shall ye have a rest, a (a day of) memorial of sounding the cornet, a holy convocation,' Lev. xxiii, 24. The biblical name of the feast is 'Day of the Trumpet,' and its object is self-examination of one's conduct during the past year and thorough repentance. The sounds of the cornet signify: 'Awaken, ye men, from your slumber of indifference and carelessness,' arouse from your lethargy (of last year's conduct) and cry: 'Remember your God, and return to the path of duty.'"

A Plethora of Provisions.

At the market Saturday there were acres of people in the midst of plenty. A country that can produce such an abundance of grain and fruit, vegetables and roots, hay, meats, etc., is one that ought to be prosperous. Beef was offered at 20 cents, lamb at 24 to 30 cents, and pork at 6 to 6 1/2 cents per pound, in carcasses. Hay sold at \$10 per ton and straw at \$3 25 per load. A fine lot of young porkers were on the market, and poultry was plentiful. The choicest apples sold at 25 cents per bushel, and potatoes at 40 cents per bag. Tomatoes were down to 20 cents a bushel. Melons, citrons, cucumbers and corn were plentiful. Green corn in October is an unusual luxury. Eggs and butter were in good demand. Celery and cauliflower were very choice and abundant in supply. Peaches at 10 cents per basket, and sweetford grapes at 25 cents per 10 pound basket completed the more noticeable luxuries. Between 10 and 11 o'clock the crowd in places was so great that for a time there was a blockade. Complimenting a well-known Canadian farmer on the abundant crop of the past season, and the beautiful weather of the past month, an ADVERTISER representative was paroled by the reply: "Yes, but it's most awfully dry and dusty now."
