Local Legal Notes.

At Osgoode Hall, Torento, yesterday, the following cases were dealt with:

Attorney-General of Ontario vs. Ætna Insurance Company—Judgment on appeal by the defendants from the judgment of the trial judge, Galt, C.J., in favor of the plaintiff in an action to recover from several insurance companies the amount of loss surtained by reason of a fire upon the prempainting an acceptance of a fire upon the premises of the Provincial Asylum for the Insane at London. The question in the action was whether the building in which the fire occurred was part of the main building, and the trial judge found that the term "main building," as used in the policies, included the portion in which the fire occurred. Appeal dismissed with costs, this court agreeing with and confirming the judgment of Galt, C.J. Osler, Q.C., and W. Nesbitt for the defendants; Irving, Q.C., and Lount, Q.C., for the plaintiff.

Anderson vs. Fish.—Judgment on appeal by the plaintiff from the judgment of the Queen's Bench Divisional Court (16 O.
