## BADLY DISORGANIZED.

Football Enthusiasm in London Hush on the Wane.

No Intermediate Team This Year Although They Captured the Championship in 1895. Some causes ending up to disruption.

London had a strong intermediate football team last year—the winners of the championship of the season—the enthusiasm of London football players was only equalled by the length of their hair and the size of their chrysanthemums. But with the inevitable hair cut, the players seemed to lose their enthusiasm, and as the team faded, so their ardor cooled, and this year, instead of seeing a strong team to Toronto for the opening game Saturday, London forfeited it. Apathy and a number of unusual circumstances all tended towards the end. Waverly, a strong half-back, has a varicose vein. Stringer, the best forward London has produced, is absent in England, attending Oxford University. McManis, a powerful strong forward, is on the road now. G. Sippi, one of the most aggressive of the left wings, cannot play for fear of aggravating an injury to his head, sustained by a heavy collision last summer.

Of the remainder of the club, Frank Field, half-back, and Niven, back, are the only ones who have managed to practice this year. Such strong men as Humphrey, Art Sippi, Crawford, Evans, Mills, Lind, Macbeth, Gillespie, Pope and O'Brien, appear to have lost all interest in the game, and Zerkoff is dead as far as this season is concerned.

One player sent to an "Advertiser" reporter that he had decided to quit rather than have to tug the expense of some of the other players out of town, as some members of the team had to do last year. Again, public appreciation of the game in London was not sufficient to foster it.

—Mr. L. G. Jarvis, manager of the poultry department of A. C. Guelph, formerly of London, has been invited to judge at the great exposition of poultry and pet stock to be held in Washington, D. C., in February, 1896.

—Of the annual meeting of the West Bruce Teachers' Association, which will be held in Kincardine this week, the Review says: Mr. John Dearness, one of the most energetic and progressive teachers in the province, is down for reading, composition, book-keeping and school-room sanitation.

—Rev. J. H. Sowerby, of Chatham, gave two powerful sermons yesterday in Adelaide Street Baptist Church. His morning theme was "Receiving Christ," while the evening subject was "God's Free Grace."

—Elder Advocate: The goosebore is nearly all white this year, and the result will be that snow will be on the ground from early in December until late in April. From the first the meetings were well attended and the interest continued to increase as time went on. About 60 profess to have experienced conversion; 20 names have been handed in for church membership; five or six will go to the Baptist Church, and one or two to the Presbyterian. The evangelists have begun work in Grace Church, St. Thomas.
