Almost every year sees some apparently improbable and impossible dream of the past realized, sometimes by slow and readily comprehended steps, sometimes by a great stride in to the unknown dark, as in the case the X-ray. As a plain matter-of advance, reference may be made to Jules Verne's story, "Around the World in Eighty Days," published more than twenty years ago. such a feat has been doubly discount ed, and even without the resources and fertile expedients of Verne's famous traveler it is now possible to go around

days however, science no longer concerns itself. It is a mere working out to their fuller application of facts long ago made more commonplace. What the wizards of the laboratory are thinking of and dreaming about today are discoveries and advances by means of which the practical achievements of this century will hereafter be also commonplace.
