158 Pounds Without Loss of  
Vitality.

San Francisco, May 15.—Hugo Kelley and Billy Papke are scheduled to fight 45 rounds at Colma this afternoon in a fourth attempt to settle the question of superiority that has puzzled fight followers for years.

In their previous battles, Papke was awarded the decision in the first encounter; the second was a draw, and in the third meeting, which was called a draw, Kelley is said to have made the better showing.

Beschler was fined \$50, for taking his time in leaving the field after being ordered to do so by Umpire Cusack, and Roth was fined \$25 for attacking the umpire. Manager Griffith was ejected from the game for disputing the umpire's decision.
