CANADIAN IMPORTS

Thirteen and a Half Millions Came in From the States.

Washington, Nov. 14.—More of the foreign merchandise imported from the United States in the fiscal year of 1910 was sent to the Dominion of Canada than to any other country. This class of trade amounted alone to \$13,500,000. Something of the magnitude of trade with Canada can be estimated through the fact that of \$7,666,000 of India rubber, exported from the United States, \$2,233,000 went across the Canadian frontier. Last year was a big one for exports of foreign merchandise from the United States.

A new record was made with exports of this class, which amounted to \$35,000,000.

Until 1910 a record year was 1903, when exports of this class reached \$28,000,000, but more recently they have been less, and in 1909 they reached only \$25,000,000.

The gain is 25 per cent over the previous high water mark, 41 per cent over the year preceding, and 33 per cent over the annual average.

HEAVY SENTENCE.

Red Deer, Alta., Nov. 13.—Clarke Woods, convicted of the manslaughter of Hector Murray, a railway contractor, near here, was sentenced by Chief Justice Harvey to ten years in the penitentiary. Woods, while drunk, quarreled with Murray over wages, and later came back and struck him over the head with a whiskey bottle. Murray was a Toronto man.

PREMIER ASQUITH

Continued From Page One.

London, Nov. 15.—The first week in December has been set, it is understood, as the time for holding the general elections. This has been decided upon and will probably be announced by Premier Asquith tomorrow.

T. P. O'Connor, one of the Irish leaders, in discussing the political situation today, said that it was now or never for the Irish Nationalists to stand together.

"I deprecate the attitude of the O'Brienites, who seem bent on splitting the party when it is now at its strongest," said he. "Never in the history of English and Irish politics has Ireland had an opportunity like the present. The Irish party has sufficient strength to control the situation, and is doing everything in its power to gain freedom for Ireland, at least. I will secure the best terms possible. The session ends abruptly. It will have been a most important one which shall listen to my plea."

John Redmond has similar views and his contention was that the struggle for Irish home rule has now attained the point where only a short but active fight is necessary.

Origin of Trouble.

The trouble started over a year ago, when the Liberal party passed George's budget, which had passed through the House of Commons. This resulted in the dissolution of Parliament and a general election. The election, which was held early this year.

The voters endorsed the budget and returned the Liberal party to power, but with such a small majority that the Government had to depend on the Irish members to carry through its programme. This placed the Irish party in a position of dictation, and when the new Parliament reassembled last spring, the Irish leaders insisted on the passage of a set of resolutions limiting the veto power of the House of Lords, before the consideration of the budget. The matter was finally settled in the Lower House by the introduction of the Budget Bill, which aimed to pass a law to prevent the House of Lords from rejecting or amending a money bill, but that such limitations shall not in any wise affect the rights and privileges of the Commons as they now exist.

The Second Resolution.

The second of the resolutions provided that the powers of the House of Lords respecting all other bills be restricted, so that if any bill shall be passed by the Commons at three successive sessions and be rejected by the Lords at each of these sessions, it shall become a law without the assent of the Lords, provided that at least two years shall have elapsed between the introduction of the measure and its third passage by the House of Commons. The third resolution limited the duration of a parliament to five instead of seven years.

House Took a Recess.

After the Commons had again passed the budget, and forced the Lords to allow it, Parliament took a recess until May 28, when the veto resolutions were to be considered.

Before the date came around, however, the Grim Reaper claimed the much beloved King Edward, and the whole country was under a period of mourning. Following the cessation of ceremonies, incidental to the burial of the King, a more friendly attitude was manifested by the leaders of the dissenting parties. Both sides showed a willingness to settle the matter without precipitating an election so soon after the obsequies. It was finally agreed that all the unfortunate differences should be settled by a conference committee composed of members of both parties.

This committee, which is composed of Premier Asquith, Lord Grey, Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. A. Birrell, representing the Government, and Mr. Arthur Balfour, Lord Lansdowne, Earl Cawdor and Mr. Austen Chamberlain, representing the Opposition, has been holding meetings with a view to reaching an agreement, but has ended with no agreement reached and hence another appeal to the electorate early in January.

Obstacle in the Way.

The House of Lords is said to be the one obstacle in the way of home rule for Ireland, and when the Irish leaders cast their vote for the budget it was with the understanding that the Government would see to it that a bill was passed limiting the veto of the House of Lords in order to get a home rule bill through.

What Laborites Demand.

The decision created a furore in labor circles and the labor unions now demand that a bill be passed giving them the right to use the money for political purposes. Such a bill would get through the Commons all right, but would have a hard time in the House of Lords.

New York, Nov. 14.—Theodore R. Burgtorf was shot and instantly killed by his wife, Anna, in their home in Bronx borough today. After shooting her husband, Mrs. Burgtorf turned the revolver on herself, the bullet entering her body. She was taken in an unconscious condition to the Fordham Hospital, where it was said that she would probably die.

SCOTT WILL CASE AGAIN POSTPONED

Court Says That Nephew Arthur Should Be Made a Defendant in Suit

The action of Wesley Scott taken to break his father's will was again postponed at the night session of the non-jury sittings of the high court before Chief Justice Mulock.

The executors of the estate of Harvey Scott, Joseph Vining, et al., were named as the defendants in the action brought by Wesley Scott, whose wife was killed by a motor car in London (England), after a happy married life with Fulford, and left him her entire estate. Mrs. Lillian Fulford says she and Fulford were married on Jan. 19 in this city, and that after a trip to Palm Beach, they went to Philadelphia, where most of the money left by Annie Pixley is invested. She brought suit in April in Philadelphia to prevent him and his niece from dissipating this property. She claimed that he came under the influence of his niece and that their intention was to dissipate the property so that she could not compel him to support her. Mrs. Fulford said that the niece, Mrs. Honeysett, was keeping her husband away from her, and that Mrs. Honeysett had said that Fulford would claim he had never married her.

TRUE BILL AGAIN BLONDIN FOR MURDER

Slayer of Dr. Empey Was Indicted by Jury at L'Original.

L'Original, Ont., Nov. 14.—After being out for nearly an hour, the grand jury returned a true bill indicting Albert Blondin for the murder of Dr. Wm. A. Empey, at Vars, on the 18th of August last, at the court house, L'Original, today.

Story of the Shooting.

On Aug. 18 Blondin, a prosperous farmer, summoned the physician to his home, which is situated in the village of Vars, eighteen miles east of Ottawa, and when the doctor got to the room where Blondin was supposed to be ill the latter shot him with a double-barrelled shotgun. Dr. Empey died at the home of a neighbor, where he staggered, as a result of a wound in his stomach, a few hours after being shot. He was 54 years of age. Dr. Empey made a statement to Rev. J. Cormack of Vars, saying that Albert Blondin deliberately and willfully shot him. This statement was made out in writing, which the dying physician signed, and a few moments afterwards passed away.

Mr. Edmund Meredith, K. C., London, appearing for the prosecution, called Blondin as a witness. On Friday morning which was granted by Mr. Justice Britton, who is presiding at the sittings here. Over two score of witnesses have been called to give evidence on the case, which is arousing unusual interest in the district.

MILK CONFERENCE

W. F. Nickle Will Represent Canada at Gathering in New York.

Toronto, Nov. 15.—The Provincial Government has appointed Mr. W. F. Nickle, M. P. of Kingston, to represent the Province at the International Milk Conference to be held in New York city on Dec. 2 and 3. Mr. Nickle will also address the conference, representing Hon. J. S. Duff, the minister of agriculture, who is unable to attend the conference.

It is probable that the Government will submit important legislation at the ensuing session of the Legislature dealing with the milk problem. The character and scope of the measure have not yet been indicated by the minister, but it is likely to follow the line laid down in the report of the Ontario milk commission submitted to the House at its last session.

The pure milk problem has loomed large within the past few years and the Government has given the matter much personal study. The conference which he goes to attend will include prominent sanitarians, health officers and authorities on public hygiene from the states from which the New York milk supply is derived, and the representatives of the state and national departments having to do with the food supplies of the people. Mr. Nickle will present the Ontario point of view in the discussions.

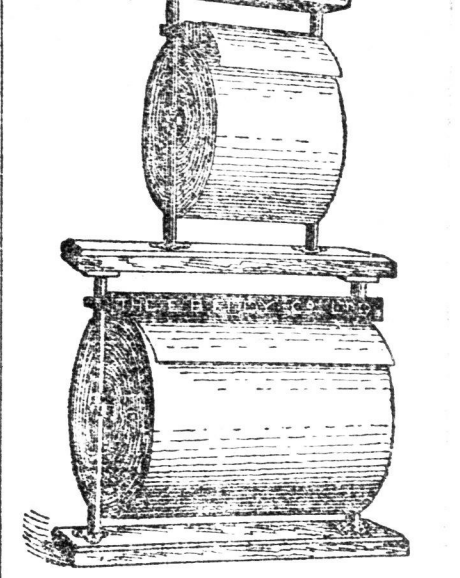
