He alleges that by this contract he was to remain on his father's farm and work it until the death of Scott, sen., when the property would be willed to him (Wesley). Should either parties to this contract fail to carry out the agreement, the other was to be entitled to damages.

Mr. McEvoy claimed that Harvey Scott had elected to break the contract by willing the land to his nephew, and that the land having been suit for damages.

His lordship expressed the opinion that although the will had been probated the land is not yet beyond the reach of the plaintiff if he can prove the existence of the alleged contract. 
