Gunmen Leader Shot to Death

New York, Oct. 6.—Big Jack Zelig, the eastside gang leader, who is said to have "passed the word along" to the gunmen of his gang to kill Herman Rosenthal last July, was shot early last night as 'le was riding in a northbound Second avenue car at Fourteenth street, by an eastside fruit dealer named Philip Davidson, and died in a Bellevue ambulance while being taken to the hospital,

Davidson climbed upon the open trolley car, and fired a bullet that entered Zelig's head just back of the right ear. The murderer told the police later that he had killed Zelig because this afternoon Zelig had enticed Davidson into a doorway in Broome street, near Eldridge street, had beaten the fruit dealer with a blackjack, and had then robbed him of more than \$400 in cash. Upon seeing Zelig riding alone in the open car in Second avenue about three hours later, Davidson, according to his own story, had chased the car for more than a block, and then had killed Zelig in punishment for the beating and loss of money he had suffered at Zelig's hands during the afternoon.

Davidson bore bruises about his eyes and on the jaw to substantiate his story of being beaten up by Zelig earlier in the day. When Zelig's clothes were removed from his body at the morgue shortly after he died in the ambulance, the police found \$500 in cash in one of the murdered gangster's pockets.
