Complete Matriculants:
In group A under each county are given the names of all candidates who have obtained complete matriculation by passing on the twelve required examination papers, which are as follows: English literature, English composition, British and Canadian history, ancient history, algebra, geometry, Latin authors, Latin composition, together with the four papers in any of the following subjects: Experimental science (physics and chemistry), French (authors and composition), German (authors and composition), Greek (authors and composition).

Partial Matriculants:
In group B under each county are given the names of those who have passed on at least nine of the papers required for complete matriculation and have obtained the minimum required on the whole examination, but who have failed in not more than three papers. This fact will be shown on their certificates. In order to complete their matriculation they must pass in the remaining papers on one examination, the standard for pass being 40 per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper.

In group C under each county are given the names of those candidates who have been granted partial matriculation under the regulation, which reads:

"A candidate who has obtained 40 per cent. on each of at least eight papers, with an average of 60 per cent. on the same, will be credited with these papers. In order to complete his matriculation he must obtain at least 40 per cent. on each of the remaining papers, with an average of 60 per cent. Such candidates failed to obtain the minimum required on the whole examination, but who have obtained their matriculation they must obtain at least 40 per cent. on each of the remaining papers with an average of 60 per cent. on the same. Candidates for matriculation into the faculty of applied science who have obtained 40 per cent. on each of at least eight of their pass papers and an average of 60 per cent. on the same, are reported in this list. The honor standing of such candidates in mathematics has already been published with the honor matriculation results.

Other Candidates:
In group D under each county are given the names of those who have written upon any number of matriculation papers less than the eight required for partial matriculation, and who have obtained 40 per cent. on each of the papers upon which they have written, but who have not obtained partial matriculation, as in the case of those in groups B and C. In this list will be found the names of those candidates who have written only on those papers required for matriculation into the Ontario College of Pharmacy, and who have obtained 40 per cent. on each of those papers.

The statements of standing of all candidates will be sent to the principals of the high schools and collegiate institutions, or to the public school inspectors in a few days. In the case of those who wrote at the University of Toronto, their statements will be sent to the registrar of that institution. Candidates will apply to these officials, not to the department, for the reports in detail.

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RAILROAD-OWNED SHIPS WOULDN'T HURT CANAL

Senator Burton Says Adequate Laws Would Prevent Their Getting Control

[Canadian Press.]
Washington, D. C., Aug. 9.—During the debate on the Panama Canal bill today, Senator Burton, of Ohio, declared a prohibition against railroad-owned ships from using the canal would restrict the full development of the waterway. The fear that railroads could drive out all other ships and ultimately control rates could be fully met by adequate laws, he said.

Senator Burton asked Senator Burton whether he believed the point had been reached in American development where a regulated monopoly must be recognized in railroad transportation. "That is practically it," said Senator Burton.

"I believe we are near the parting of the ways," said Senator Kenyon, "where we must decide between competition for railroads or combinations held under the control of the Government."

Senator Burton said he did not favor absolutely free use of the Panama Canal by railroad-owned ships. He favored control by the Interstate Commerce Commission of ships owned or controlled by railroads.
