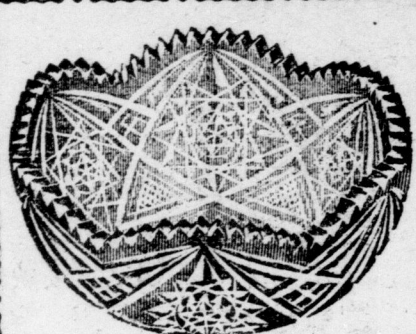

EX-ALD. DONNELLY

EXPLAINS POSITION

Was Not Anxious To Get a Seat on
the Council.

Ex-Ald. James Donnelly denies that
he has been seeking a position on the
council when he was not elected to it.

"I went to the elections and was thir-

teenth man," he stated in an interview
yesterday. "I expressed myself as absolutely
opposed to the council, and I did not want
to be elected. I had no intention of
being myself on them. Later I was in-
formed that I was elected, and I was in-
structed to take the oath of qualification. I
went to the city clerk's office and told him
that I would not sign, offering to retire
in favor of any person who desired it.
I was told that if I were elected, and did
not take the oath of qualification, I was
liable to a fine. I signed but had no in-
tention of forcing my way into the coun-
cil. I do not think it fair to be ac-
cused of forcing my way in. Those who
know me understand that I am not like
that."

BRITISH AND FOREIGN
BIBLE SOCIETY MEETING

Will Be Held in New Masonic Hall
on Tuesday, Jan. 21.

It is expected that the annual meet-
ing of the London branch of the Brit-
ish and Foreign Bible Society, which
will be held in the new Masonic Hall
on Tuesday, Jan. 21, will be the most
successful in the history of the local
branch. The committees in past
years have obtained one prominent
out-of-town speaker for the occasion,
and this year the principal address
will be given by Principal Falconer,
of Toronto University. The past year
has been the most successful of the
organization, both financially and
otherwise, and the officers are deter-
mined that the interest in the society
in this district shall not lapse.

Those having charge of the prepa-
rations for the meeting are Dr. Ross,
who was elected president of the Lon-
don branch at the last meeting of the
executive, and a committee composed
of Rev. J. G. Inkster, convenor, Prin-
cipal Walker, Rev. H. H. Bingham and
A. E. Jordon. In past years the music
has been a feature of the meetings,
and this year Mr. A. D. Jordan will
have charge of the musical part of
the program. A choir numbering over
100 voices, and composed of the mem-
bers of the choir of the First Meth-
odist and First Presbyterian Churches
will render a number of selections.

**HORSE JUMPED

Farmer Injured at the Corner of King
and Wellington Streets.

occurred very suddenly, and before

was one of the pioneers of East Nis-
souri. He sold his farm and retired to

He is survived by four sisters, Mrs.
Hugh Davidson, Mrs. George Snetsinger,
Mrs. Mrs. James Patterson and Miss
Cowan, who is spending the winter
with Mrs. Snetsinger, who is very
