

Berne, Switzerland, from Germany, says a dispatch to the wireless press, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German chancellor, upon being lestioned at the August meeting of the federal council as to why he releded to the demands of the United States regarding the unrestricted or pedoing of ships on the high seas, replied emphatically that the alue of the submarine was exaggerated by the adherents of wholesale


