MAJESTIC THEATRE
HAVE REAL COMEDY**

**S. J. Meredith Production Is
Screamingly Funny.**

MUSIC ESPECIALLY FINE
In Addition First-Class Mov-
ing Picture Feature Is
Presented.

Once again a Stanley J. Meredith

**REAL HEART THROBS
IN FEATURE PICTURE
AT GRAND THEATRE**

Nazimova, Starring in "The
Brat," Holds House
Spellbound.

Nazimova, the incomparable, carried
a crowded house at the Grand
Theatre through all the heart-throbs,
pathos and humor of "The Brat," a de-
lightful play that grips the spectator
as no other picture has in many months.

While the story itself is such that it
makes one forget himself in the reading
of it, yet when one sees it interpreted
by Nazimova, he verily lives through
all the thrills, disappointments, fights
and triumphs of "the brat."

The story narrates the whimsical
romance of "the brat," a nameless
child of the charity institutions who
grifts into the chorus of cheap musical
show, is insulted and then hailed to
the night court on a trumped-up charge.
There an author who is seated on the
bench with the judge sees in her just
the type of a woman he has been seeking
as the heroine of a new novel he is
to write.

MacMillan Forrester, the author,
takes the bedraggled child-woman to
his home, shocking his aristocratic
mother and arousing the angry resent-
ment of Angela, his blue-blooded fiancée.
From studying his protégée, the writer's
interest grows deeper while she win-
ships him and seeks constantly to show
her gratitude.

The novelist's brother is a ne'er-do-
well. It was he who insulted "the
brat" and had her haled to the Night
Court. He later confronts her in his
home. They are, of course, enemies,
but the girl shows her noble qualities
by intervening when the weak brother
is about to commit a crime. After many
trials she triumphs, and the ending is
both happy and unexpected.

Nazimova's acting is superb, and her
adroit characterization is heightened by
the generally humorous quality of the
subtleties which convey "the brat's" odd
collection of slang phrases and whimsi-
cal philosophy. J. B. Bryant does ex-
cellent work as the absent-minded
author, and a splendid bit of character
acting is contributed by Frank Currier as the
Bishop.

The vaudeville bill is a particularly
strong one, for all of the five acts are
good. The headline attraction, billed as
the "Midnight Madness" has a unique
way of "putting over" some splendid
singing and good comedy. Manuel
Romana has a fine voice while his as-
sistants, Powers and Dalemara, are
both singing. The stage settings are
elaborate.

Mabel Fonda Trio does some un-
usually clever juggling. Many novel-
ties in the juggling of Indian clubs

and electrical effects are staged.
