TORONTO, June 6 .- (By Canadian Press) .- An indication that an attempt vill be made to unite the Presbyterian General Assembly on a middle ground between immediate organic union with Methodist and Congregational churches and indefinite delay was sup-

plied when the debate on church union was resumed this afternoon. At present there are just two motions, sent on by the special union committee, before the assembly; one calling for consummation of union "as expeditiously as possible," and an amendment providing that no further action be taken without a "clear and unmistakable mandate from the people."

The committee recommended that the assembly be asked to register its mind by voting on these two resolutions, and by motion carried last Friday the assembly agreed to follow that course.

Immediately after the opening this afternoon the moderator was asked whether he would accept another amendment, and he replied that the vote of the assembly on the two resolutions already before them would be regarded as decisive and final. Commissioners questioned the justice of this ruling, and Sir Robert Falconer, convener of the committee, was asked to explain the

Sir Robert said it had been the desire of the committee to avoid having the issue becouded by Jnv amendments which might be sprung on the spur of the moment on the floor of the assembly, but he thought it would be with the assembly to decide whether it would receive any more amendments were 10 not.
