LEAVES ARE CANCELLED. London, Aug. 16.—All soldiers on leave from Ireland in Alder shot and Farnborough have been ordered by telegraph to return to their regiments immediately.

Belfast, Aug. 16.—It is reported here that the military authorities in Ireland have cancelled all leaves of absence for both officers and men, and that all officers and men who are away on holidays have been recalled. It is said this step was taken merely as a precaution against surprise and has no other significance.
