### COMMENCE TO PLAN RUSSIAN RESTORATION

Russians Hold Out Against Restoring Freehold

TO **EXPERTS** 

Claim London Solution Would Mean Exploitation of Country.

Genoa, April 22.-George Chittherin, the Russian soviet foreign minister, gave the Italian socialists and communists a shock today by meeting King Victor Emmanuel on his majesty's invitation to a luncheon on board the Italian dreadnought Conte di Cavour.

Actual work on a plan for the re construction of Russia was started today by experts representating the oviet government, Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Belgium, Czecho-Slovakia and Holland. The heated politics surrounding the Russian problems has been cooled by M. Chitcherin's note accepting in the main the allied formula stating the erms on which the great powers are willing to resume business relations with Russia. The question is thus suddenly changed from political to economic, as far as the Genoa conference is concerned, and there seem to be bright prospects for a suc cessful outcome. The single important point of difference between resentatives is the unwillingness of the former to restore the freehold title of foreigners property, which has been nationalized or requisitioned in Russia, although they are willing for their use

### 7 YEARS TODAY AT YPRES, HUNS ADDED POISON GAS TO WAR'S HORRORS

T was out past the historic town of Ypres, out beyond the village of St. Julien, shortly after 4 o'clock, seven years ago this afternoon.
