\$637,000 YOTED FOR SCHOOLS

Board of Education Approves of Expenditure During 1922.

ONE TRUSTEE OBJECTS

Motion To Defer Building of West London School Unsupported.

In the words of Trustee Bryden Campbell, "an odd \$100,000 here or there doesn't seem to make much difference" when the board of education proceeds to vote money for new schools. With the former standing absolutely alone in opposition, the trustees in special session Monday approved of the expenditure of \$637,000 for that purpose.

Trustee Bice, chairman of No. 2 committee, opened negotiations with a bid for \$267,000, of which \$175,000 is designed to take care of Empress Avenue, West London; \$82,000 will build the school at the corner of Dakin and Price streets, and the remaining \$10,000 will go for the purchase of another East London school site, preferably on Florence

Trustee Bryden Campbell protested as to the probable cost of the Empress Avenue structure. "We don't know whether it will cost \$175,000 or more. We should be positive as to this. I move that we build the Dakin Street School, purchase the Eleanor street site as well as the West London site, but defer the building of the latter until 1923."
