ATTEND BURIAL OF FR. CLOHECY

Throngs Pack Proton Church To Hear Impressive Funeral Service.

Slain Pastor of St. Patrick's Parish Interred At Hamilton.

OWEN SOUND, Aug. 25.—The remains of Rev. Father Clohocy, said to have been shot down in St. Patrick's Church, Proton, by John Cosgrove, were taken to Hamilton today for burial after a largely attended service at St. Patrick's Church, the scene of the crime, this morning. The whole countryside turned out to do honor to the late priest, and when the service in the church commenced the building was packed to the doors. Fully a thousand people from all over the district, besides relatives from Hamilton and friends from many parts of the province, joined in this last tribute to the much-loved priest. There were twelve priests from the district and other parts of Ontario.

Requiem Mass Sung.
Requiem high mass was sung by Rev. Father McGee of Markdale and Rev. Father Halm of Ayrton, preached an eloquent sermon. The service lasted about one hour and was very impressive.

The remains were conveyed by motor hearse to Hamilton and were accompanied by eight or ten motor cars filled with sorrowing friends.

The latest particulars of the shooting reveals the fact that Father Clohocy was shot inside the church. He was in the church and started out into the vestibule when he met his assailant. The latter pointed something at the priest which the latter first supposed to be a stick.

Father Clohocy retreated into the church and slammed the doors. He waited inside for a considerable time and again essayed to come out. He had the door open only about six inches when the assailant thrust the muzzle of the rifle and pulled the trigger, the bullet going through the priest's left lung.

Assailant Escaped.
It is reported that the deaf mute had repeatedly threatened the life of Father Clohocy and the latter became alarmed for his safety. He wrote to John Cosgrove's father asking the latter to take steps to protect him from his son. The letter, it is claimed, came to the knowledge of the deaf mute and seemed to serve to enrage him the more against the priest. Several months ago Cosgrove attacked Father Clohocy in Connelly's house and since then he has made threats, it is alleged.

STREET CAR JUMPS TRACKS, 22 HURT

SYRACUSE, Aug. 25.—A crowded trolley car ran wild down Walnut avenue hill during a terrific rain and electrical storm here tonight, jumped the tracks, after speeding three city blocks, and was wrecked against concrete and metal lighting poles on a corner. Twenty-two of the passengers were removed to hospitals. Eleven passengers were found to be seriously injured.

The car left the rails as it struck a curb and piling up with terrific force against the poles, was bent in the shape of a letter "V" by the force of the impact. The middle doors of the car were jammed against the pole, and could not be used. The front door was opened and the injured, bleeding and with their clothing torn, were making their way out of the debris when the rescuers came from every direction. Rear windows were smashed, and injured were helped out. Two women were unconscious, a dozen others were dazed and some hysterical.

ASK GOVERNMENT TO CONTROL FUEL

HARTFORD, Aug. 25.—Thomas W. Russell, fuel administrator for Connecticut, last night sent a telegram to the members of the Senate and House of Representatives from this state, declaring the situation in Connecticut seems to indicate the necessity for utmost promptness in the passing of legislation affecting government control of coal distribution.

Premier King Will Visit His Native City Sept. 13-14.

KITCHENER, Aug. 25.—Word was received in this city today from the secretary of Premier King that the prime minister has definitely decided upon Sept. 13 and 14 as the dates of his visit to his native city and county. A joint meeting of the board of trade and the city council is being arranged to complete preparations for the reception of Kitchener's distinguished son.

CHATHAM WOMAN TAKES OWN LIFE

Body of Mrs. Zephyr Cheff Discovered in Attic by Husband.

CHATHAM, Aug. 25.—With a cord tied to a bed-post, and which she had evidently wrapped around her neck, the lifeless body of Mrs. Zephyr Cheff was discovered in the attic of her home at noon today by her husband. The gruesome discovery is reported to have been made shortly after the noon hour.

The matter was reported to Coroner McRitchie, who immediately left for the scene of the alleged suicide to conduct an investigation.

Details of the affair are somewhat lacking, but it is believed that Mrs. Cheff took her own life in a fit of despondency. She is stated to have been in indifferent health for some time, and at times had brain trouble.

The deceased woman was 50 years of age, and is survived by her husband, a daughter, at home, and a son who is stated to be practicing medicine at Ottawa.

LENINE PLANNED TO OUST GOMPER

Report Seized At Bridgman Is Said To Outline Plans For American Soviet.

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., Aug. 25.—Overthrow of Eugene V. Debs and Samuel Gompers as leaders of American labor was urged by Nikolai Lenine and the Third Internationale of Russia, according to a report seized by Federal agents in the Bridgman raid.

The report was made by one of the Russian delegates to the Communist convention, which broke up when federal agents arrested 17 delegates. Allen Meyers, special agent in charge of the investigation, declared that the report outlined the plans of the Russian Reds to establish a Soviet in this country.

Agents were working to determine whether the report was brought to this country by Arnold Losowsky or Maurice Reinstein, who are known to have been delegates from Russia. Both men escaped shortly before the raid.

The report reveals that the Trades Union Educational League, headed by William Z. Foster, is an offshoot of the Third Internationale, Meyers stated.

"This report revealed a clear-cut revolutionary program calling on the Communists to overthrow the 'old machine' of Gompers and accept the dictatorship of the proletariat."

"The manuscript stated that the collapse of the Socialist Party in this country was due to the fact that they did not 'organize the masses.'"

"Debs was a man who never really grasped the significance of the organization of man," the report said.

"This message from Lenine stated that organization of the masses in a revolution program to overthrow conservative leaders, such as Gompers, was the only plan."

Meyers also declared that delegates at the convention had branded rail union leaders as "cowards" who "did not dare to tell their men that this brotherhood was at work."

Warrants for the arrest of 40 additional radicals have been issued by Berrien County authorities following the examination of documents seized in the raid.

As in the case of the seventeen radicals arrested by the raiders, the warrants contain two counts—violation of the Michigan anti-syndicalism law and conspiracy against the government. Federal agents said that arrests would probably be made today in several cities; more than a dozen of them in New York.

A deputy sheriff has gone to Lansing to secure extradition papers for William T. Foster of Chicago, president of the Trades Union Educational League, arrested there on information furnished by federal operatives working at Bridgman. The deputy will later go to Springfield, Ill., to submit the papers to Governor Small.

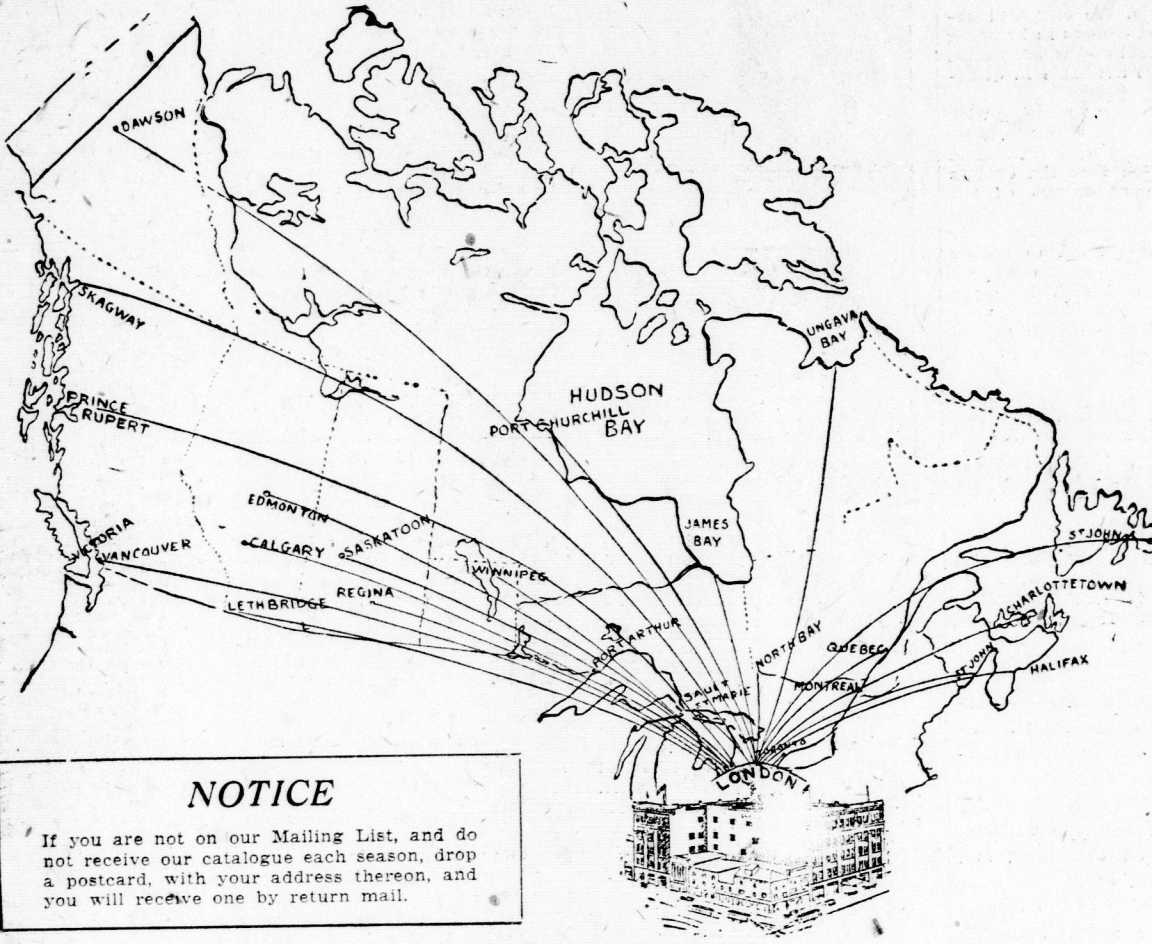
DRIVES BURGLAR FROM HIS HOME WITH SHOTGUN

Germans Seized With Panic As Mark Slowly Continues To Decline in Value

BERLIN, Aug. 25.—"Panic" is the only word which properly describes the effect of the fall of the mark from 1,432 to 1,950 to the dollar inside of 24 hours. The government is dazed, the people are stricken numb, and the shops are closing up or being overrun by wild-eyed men and women trying to convert their pieces of paper into something tangible.

The government appears to be helpless, with the reparations commission remaining in Berlin until this evening and the principal questions still unresolved. Members of the Wirth cabinet are wavering between making far-reaching concessions toward meeting Premier Poincare's demands in order to stabilize the mark, or breaking off the negotiations and begging the reparations commission for mercy for Germany.

The situation is far gloomier than anything predicted by Chancellor Wirth when he met the foreign correspondents less than a week ago. There seems to be no way of stopping Germany's headlong dash toward the same precipice at the bottom of which the bones of the former great powers, Russia and Austria, are bleaching now. By a strange coincidence the Austrian prime minister, Dr. Siegel, came to Berlin in quest of financial and economic support on the day the mark hit its lowest level.

BESSEMER ROAD ISSUES ULTIMATUM TO WORKERS

GREENVILLE, Pa., Aug. 25.—Striking employees of the Bessemer and Lake Erie Railroad today were notified that they will forfeit their jobs and all privileges unless they return to work before 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Some of the 1,200 shop workers here went out August 12. The road is an underlying company of the United States Steel Corporation.

Mines along the Bessemer and Lake Erie are producing about 200 cars of coal daily, loading reports of the road show. When the strike of miners started production fell to 20 cars a day. The big Ford colliery mines in the Freeport region have been reopened.

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
