LIBERAL M. P.'S WELCOME CONTEST

La Pointe Opens Campaign in
St. Jean, Quebec--Position
of Quebec.

St. Jean, Port Joli, Que., Sept. 6.--
Opening the Liberal campaign here
last evening, Ernest Lapointe, M. P.
for Quebec East, addressing 3,000 el-
ectors, said the decision of the federal
government to hold a general election
this year could not be more agreeable
to anybody than it was to the Liberal
members.

Mr. Meighen had maintained that
the elections would be fought on the
tariff issue. He was not serious.

The question was not more urgent this
year than it was last year.

The real reason for the govern-
ment's decision was that it was
crumbling under public disfavor.

The best men of the union government had
disappeared in Borden, Rowell, Mac-
Lean, Newburn and Grier, but the
others did not wish to go.

The new name, "National-Liberal-Conservative",
which they had adopted, meant nothing.
The people wanted sincere men
at the head of the government.

Meighen and his followers were too well
known now. Meighen had employed
every means possible to attract his
adversaries of the Province of Quebec,
but all his most attractive offers had
not been heeded.

The government was afraid of Quebec's solid block, but
the block could be attributed to the govern-
ment, for it was the direct result
of their callous campaign.

The government held that Quebec was iso-
lated, but the entire country was with
Quebec against Meighen. It was the
country which was isolated from Meighen,
and the next elections would
prove that.

The Christian doctrine called for
pardon of those who did wrong, but it
did not call for confidence in those who
did not wrong.

The French-Canadians had the greatest respect
for Hon. Mr. King, who did not pre-
fess the same religion as they did.

On the tariff issue, he said, the atti-
tude of the Liberal party was very
simple. They wanted to continue the
policy of Laurier, which had given
Canada sixteen years of unprecedented
prosperity.

What was wanted was a
tariff for revenue only, and not a high
protective tariff. Meighen could not
pretend to be fighting the Liberals on
free trade, for they did not want free
trade. It was absurdity. It was a
folly to talk of trying to establish free
trade.

Press Party See Sights of Can-
ada from Victoria to East
Via C. P. R.

Calgary, June 16.--Our visit to Cal-
gary was a most pleasant one. With
the usual western hospitality we were
taken care of and shown the city
today.

At nine o'clock members of the var-
ious city organizations were on hand
at the Palliser Hotel with autos to
show us the city, and this was well
accomplished. We visited the big
Burns packing house and the Calgary
stock yards, but business in this line
was very quiet.

Calgary is the third largest city of the west, and like every
other city, it is spread over miles
of vacant prairie land, with hundreds of
vacant blocks and lots which will be
many years before they are utilized.

The business sections are very up-
to-date, and, although business condi-
tions are not good the stores are well
stocked. Very little building is going
on.

We visited the various parks, which
are in keeping with the western spirit
and the educational institutions are
thoroughly modern and a credit to the
city.

After a civic luncheon was tendered
the newspaper press, when Mayor
Adams was on hand and formally wel-
comed us to "the greatest city on
earth." The thanks of the party were
tendered the officials and people of
Calgary for their splendid reception by
Rev. A. H. Moore of the St. John's
(Que.) Church in a well-orchestrated
address.

After luncheon our time was our
own. A friend and I spent an hour
looking over the plan of the Calgary
Herald which is housed in one of the
most modern buildings in the city.

The Herald has a big staff, and we had
the pleasure of meeting Chief Long-
plance, a full blooded Sarsi Indian, who
had a college education, been overseas,
and was then a reporter on the Herald.

He was an active pleasant fellow and
it was hard to believe that his fore-
fathers were the original inhabitants,
and roamed the vast trackless prairies.

At five o'clock promptly we left
Calgary. When fairly under way we
were informed that a little variation
of the program had been planned so
that we might visit Strathmore.

The cordiality of the village of
Strathmore, practically a C.P.R. town,
where is situated the Supply Farm,
producing eggs by the clothes basket
and barrel full, and where are the
finest Holstein herd in North Amer-
ica, was overflowing. Here a most
spontaneous welcome was given and
all the motor cars in the town turned
out to convey the party through the
supply farm and irrigation ditches.

The town band played all the time and
school children sang "O Canada" while
the Mayor, Frank Butler, extended a
hearty welcome.

He assured us that the key of the
town had been thrown into the lake
and the whole town was now a free
city. The male quartette, which we
never forgot, nor will they forget the
very wholesome sandwiches handed
round by the pretty girls of the town.

Prof. Hutton, agricultural expert of
the C. P. R. Natural Resources De-
partment, gave a synopsis of the work
carried on, and the visitors were
treated to the rich milk from the famous
Holstein herd. Such openhearted
hospitality was such as had never
been received during the entire jour-
ney.

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Barford Hooke, of the Leader Publishing
Company, presided, and he was
supported by Deputy Mayor Ald. F. G.
England, S. J. Latta, Minister of Edu-
cation; Ald. J. K. McInnes and Supt.
Worley, of the R.C.M.P.

Mr. Roy Carmichael, Verdun Echo,
Montreal created much merriment in
emphasizing the freedom of the Prov-
ince of Quebec, and alluding to the
understanding that the water of Re-
gina was very hard.

He was, how-
ever, informed that the supply would
only last three years, but he assured
them that the Province of Quebec had
a very good substitute. (Laughter).

It was during the visit to Regina
that the following telegram was re-
ceived by Mr. Davies, the acting pres-
ident, extending greetings from Mr. E.
W. Barry, the president of the Cana-
dian Pacific Railway Company as fol-
lows: "Will you please convey to all
the members of the Canadian Weekly
Newspaper Association the pleasure of
the Canadian Pacific in having them as
its guests. As it is to other sec-
tions, such as your journey to the prairies,
the Pacific Coast, and the Rocky
Mountains, cannot but be beneficial
to ourselves and those you visit for
their is nothing more needed in a big
and diversified country like Canada
than an interchange of opinion be-
tween all its parts. The weekly
newspaper is one of the most potent
forces in building up a successful com-
munity, and it can best achieve that
by educating its readers in the re-
sponsibility to the wider Canada be-
yond the town limits. I trust that
the remainder of your trip will be as
successful as the first part of your
journey."

We boarded our train at 1 o'clock
and proceeded on our journey arriving
at Winnipeg about midnight. Many
had not retired and upon arriving a
large number escorted a few of our
party who were leaving us to their
cars. The male quartette, which we
never forgot, nor will they forget the
time by rendering several selec-
tions, much to the amusement of Win-
nipeg citizens who were about at that
early hour.

Our next stop was at the Twin

THREE IN HOSPITAL.

TWO ARE SUICIDES

New York, Aug. 27.--Three persons
were in the hospital today, probab-
ly fatally wounded, as the result of the
raining amuck of two men with pis-
tols last night. Both the pistol well-
dressed committed suicide.

work for several months, shot his bro-
ther-in-law, William Ryan, and his
elder sister, Miss Anna Neary, and fired
one shot at Mrs. Ryan, after brooding
because Ryan told him he could re-
main no longer in the Ryan household.

He then turned the pistol on himself
Ryan and Miss Neary probably will
die of their wounds, surgeons say.

James Kay jumped into Long Island
Sound and was drowned after a chase
that followed the shooting of Mrs.
Caroline Storm, keeper of a boarding
house in which he lived. She is ex-
pected to recover.

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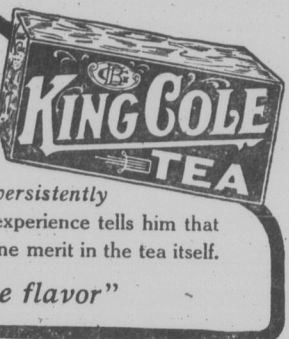
