IRVING AS HAMLET.

It is very safe to say that Toronto never saw a more wonderful Hamlet or a sweeter Ophelia than she did last night. Indeed, the whole tragedy, as placed upon the boards of the Grand Opera house last evening, was, with but a few trifling openings for criticism, one deserving of high appreciation. The more so as this play, with the single exception, perhaps, of the Midsummer Night's Dream, is of all Shakespeare's plays the most difficult to depict realistically upon a stage. There is in it so much that appeals to thought alone and not to the senses; so much underlies the mere utterances of the actor; so numerous are what Coleridge has called the "half embodying of thought," that it requires capabilities of a subtle and at the same time profound nature thoroughly to imbrue the yarlous incidents and scenes with senses.

This being the case, it was to be expected that Henry Irving would excel markedly in his representation of the hero of this drama. This, perhaps, is the highest compliment that it is possible to pay him. He deserves it well. He has worked out the character in much the same manner probably as did the author himself. First a thorough derstanding of the whole mental and ply in the same manner fully considered and harmsonious working out of that character in its every detail. In his conception of the character Mr. Irving apparently follows in broad outline that of Schlegel and Coleridge: he represents the young Prince of Denmark as a character in which the imagination preponderates over the active; he is forever musing, never doing; a melancholy strain of thought perpetually clouds his brow, the slightest pretext is seized as an opportunity for philosopizing instead of acting. Yet, at times, as is natural with such a temperament, he is hurried into unpremeditated action before almost he is aware of it. All his Mr. Irving has studied with consolentious care, and the result of that care is admirable. But further: The fame which this actor has gained on account of this attention to detail is, if anything, enhanced by witnessing its effects in this play. For example: in a character such as that of Hamlet, in which the mental faculties were turned, as it were, to their highest pitch, we would naturally expect an excessive degree of what may be called sensitiveness—an acute sympathy with the feelings of others. This, of course, Shakespeare fully intended, A great deal, however, is left to the actor, and this Mr. Irving amply supplied. It came out in strongest light in h

Miss Terry's Ophelia it is hard to find a suitable adjective by which to characterize. Mr. Ruskin has said somewhere that everybody would like as a wife a Desdemona, or an Ophelia, or an Imogen, or a Virgilia, and Miss Terry's acting of Ophelia only served to intensify the truth of the assertion.

That she appears upon the stage only for short periods of time is all that is necessary in the play; for, as Mrs. Jameson has pointed out, these are quite sufficient to teach us her whole character. At the same time such are Miss Terry's graces—physical "and intellectual, that we venture to say everybody's sincereregret was that the intervals between the parts was colonic.

that is, the death of Polonius when Ophelia has lost her reason, was truly thrilling. It needed not speech to show us the chauge; the moment she came into view from behind the flies the madness was discernible. Two points in Miss Terry's mimic representation of this madness deserve notice: First, the variety which she instilled into it; secondly, the admirable way in which she still retained her charms while laboring under this fearful malady. (This latter is no inessential property Shakeepeare himself teaches us. Witness the expressions used by the King and by Laertes when addressing Ophelia.) Some such redeeming features are necessary to redeem so unsightly a spectacle as actual mania from, if not repulsiveness, at all events an inartistic, unideal element.

He was John McCullough, the tragedian, whose recent break down at Chicago caused the cancelling of all his engagements. In response to repeated telegrams Mr. William Conner, proprietor of the St. James hotel, started for St. Louis, to bring Mr. McCullough home on Monday morning. While on the way he received a despatch saying that Mr. McCullough had left St. Louis and would meet him at Columbus. Mr. Conner reached Columbus at 4 o'clock on Truesday and found the actor there.

He was very quiet, and made no objection to retu ning to New York. They left Columbus at 10.30 o'clock, and the mext morning caught the limite texpress on the Pennsylvania road at Pittsburg. This brought them into Jersey City at 7.10 o'clock last evening, much earlier than they had expected to arrive. They were met by a number of friends, one of whom took McCallough home with him.

During the trip home McCullough was very cheerful. He smoked all the time, and sometimes talked to himself, repeating passayes from plays. He did not stay very long at the house of his friends, but went to the hotel. He thinks his mana er, Mr. Brooks, was wrong in cancelling his engagements, but he does not intend to make any trouble about it.
