The New Zealanders Easily
Whips the Nonpareil.

FITZ PLAYS WITH DEMPSEY

And Wins the Middleweight Championship of the World. Large Crowd Witnessed the Fight at New Orleans. Dempsey Very Badly Punished. The Australian Comes Up Smiling Round After Round and Known as the Most Powerful Out-Right Boxer of the World.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 14.—The fight is over and the victory is with the Australian, Bob Fitzsimmons. Those who ventured the opinion that Fitzsimmons would knock Dempsey out in a dozen rounds evidently knew what they were talking about, as a baker's dozen were required to get the Nonpareil on his feet. The fight was the title of middleweight champion of the world seven years ago, Dempsey had successfully defended the honor and thus won the sobriquet of the Nonpareil. To be sure La Blanche, the Marine, fifteen months ago defeated Dempsey, but the victory was due to an accident. To-night, however, Dempsey is a very sick man. Defeat to him means absolute ruin, and his heart is broken.

The arrangements for the fight could hardly have been improved on. All along the route and sales there were strong guards of police. The amphitheatre has a removable roof. The somewhat chilly weather of late led to the place being well roofed tonight. Under a square of electric light, stood the ring. It was 24 feet square, and of turf and of river sand, and just close enough to be springy. The ropes and stakes were padded. Four feet from the ring was another enclosure with heavy wire instead of ropes. Between the two rings were chairs for the seconds and the wire fence ensured the pugilistic parties from outside interference. Between the ring and stands was a row of excavation in which the press stands were placed. No wires were allowed into the grounds, so the correspondents fared alike. The same impartiality was shown in the division of seats, and club members left the stands at electric intervals, and club members carried all copy direct to the telegraph office.

Fitzsimmons First to Arrive.
Fitzsimmons was the first contestant to reach the club. It was a part of his program to reach the grounds before any of Dempsey's followers could get a sight of him. TRACED HIM TO TORONTO.

CAPTURE OF A CLEVER GERMAN DIAMOND RUGGLER.

He Lived Some Weeks in the Queen City. Was Married at Niagara Falls to a Woman Who Came Out From Europe With Another \$1000 Worth of Smuggled Jewelry.

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Some three weeks ago an initiation was conveyed to Special Agent Crowley to the effect that a German named Vienna was in the city and had in his possession or under his control some \$3000 worth of diamonds, a quantity of the goods in question being at Elkhorn, Wisconsin, & Co.'s auction store. The special agent's department ascertained that the goods belonged to a man named G. Lange, alias Mayer, alias Kronheim, who had left Vienna, Austria, under mysterious circumstances, & arrived at New York about twelve months ago, going thence to Toronto, Buffalo, Nashville and Chicago.
