BRITANNIA BEATEN BY THREE AND

In a Fresh Southwest Breeze the Prince ing Line Five Minutes and Twenty- words: "I did it; I did it." Eight Seconds Ahead,

Cowes, Aug. 4 .- A multitude of sight ented, gathered here this morning in all for a \$500 cup over the course of the Royal asphalt for the track allowance in McCaul Yacht Squadron. There never has been a street. The Warren-Scharffe Com; any

Yacht Squadron. There never has been a more resplendent fleet of pleasure craft in the Solent at any period in British yachting annals.

Some of the yachts present were: Sir R. W. Bulkeley's Speranza, the Marquis of Ormonde's Mirage, Albert Brassey's Czurina, Lord Dudley's Vigorna, Mr. Goelet's White Ladye, A. H. Wood's Rone, E. D. Morgan's May, Prince Henry of Battenberg's Sheila and Asphodel. Among the American yachtamen who saw the race were: Gov. Kortright of the New York Yacht Club and C. N. Stevens of Boston. Her Majesty's ship Dreadnaught and the German naval school ship Slosch lay off the club house of the Royal Yacht squadron. The finish and start of the contest were visible from several points of land, the nearest of which was West Cowes, and the villas and hotels were crowded with guests, some of whom paid big prices for roms. The course was forty-eight miles long with four turns and ran almost due east and west, each leg being about 12 miles in length. The course of the yachts after the start was westward to a mark boak off Lepe, thence eastward to amark and the Warner lightship and back to the starting point off Cowes twice around. It was over practically this samecoursea year ago to-day that the Stanita beat Royal Phelpe Carroll's centreboarder Navahoe by 7 minutes and 4 seconds.

The sky was cloudless when the giants sailed out to the starting line. There was a good breeze from the southwest, that, to the weather-wise skippers and alert pilots seemed to have in it the promise of royal

The yachts passed the club house bound for the Lepe with the seas spurting from their weather bows, leaning far to starboard. The Vigilant lost 27 seconds to her rival in this nine miles of reaching. It required no official timing to convince the Americans that their yacht, in a fine wind over a pretty good inside course, had vanquished the cutter handsomely.
