On the 16th ultimo, the Korean Minister of Household issued a proclamation announcing the intended selection of a consort for the King. According to time-honored custom, the issue of this proclamation has the effect of prohibiting for the time being the marriage of all girls of and above 13 years of age throughout the country. The Queen-elect must be a maid, and in Korea, early marriage being the prevailing custom, a choice will be practically limited to girls between 13 and 17, or 18 at most. Thirty of 40 girls are to be nominated, and from among them three will be first selected, and on one of the three the final choice will fall.

The inhabitants, numbering 30,000 in all, are now reduced to eating leaves and stalks of potatoes, various herbs, etc. Local officials find it difficult to relieve such a large number of persons, and it is feared that many will die.


