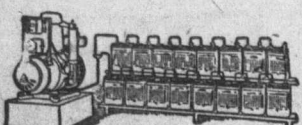

CHOP STUFF

The W. C. T. U., of Sarnia, sent a deputation to the County Council requesting the appointment of a Chaplain for the county jail.

A movement has been started in Petrolia by Mr. J. E. Armstrong to raise \$1200 by popular subscription to provide a club house, properly furnished for all returned soldiers of that district.

Glencoe's debenture debt is only \$7,226.00. The local paper remarks—"It is doubtful if any other village or town in Ontario can show such small liability compared with the assessed valuation."

Walter Westby, a resident of Petrolia for more than forty years died in the C. E. E. hospital last week after an illness of nearly seven years from creeping paralysis.

Canada has 62 winners of the Victoria Cross in the war just closed. Analyzed, 28 of the winners were born in Canada, 12 in England, 10 in Scotland and the rest in Ireland.

Flight Lieut. Dean McDonald, of Wallaceburg, who has made a name for himself as an aviator instructor, has received an offer from the Japanese government, as an instructor in the aviation service, the salary to be \$6,000 a year on a four year contract.

E. J. Cody, of Embro, is entering his 40th year as clerk of that municipality. He is one of the best known and most respected municipal men in Oxford county. He is father of Hon. Dr. Cody, minister of education for Ontario.

Mr. G. A. Brown of Leamington has delivered his tobacco crop to the Tuckett Co. of Hamilton. The crop was the largest ever grown in Canada, amounting to over 100,000 pounds and fetched over \$60,000.

Frank Littleproud and George Dudley, both of Inwood, pleaded guilty to a charge of being under the influence of liquor, laid by Inspector W. Culbert, before Magistrate G. F. Johnson and D. H. Newcombe, and each paid a fine of \$10 and costs.

According to a county court official, residents of Essex county generally, and in Windsor particularly, are living in such extravagance, spending as fast or faster than they make, that more than seven hundred of them who "own" automobiles have been obliged to file promissory notes or lien notes to guarantee payments. These notes, which are practically a chattel mortgage, are given to the automobile agents.

The Sarnia branch of the G. W. V. A., at their last regular meeting, decided among other things to organize a band from members of the association and plans are already on foot to form a high-class organization. They are also looking after the women who have returned to this country from England after the armistice was signed. A large committee was appointed to take charge of arrangements for a monster 24th of May celebration this year.

Alvinston Free Press:—While attending to the cattle one day last week, Mr. Donald McLean met with a serious accident, the real cause of which is not known and is very mysterious. The first thing his wife knew of the matter was when he came into the house in an almost unconscious condition and covered with blood. Medical attendance was called and it was thought that one of the cattle had kicked him on the head, knocking him unconscious. He laid there for some time in that condition and finally managed to get to the house. He is now able to be around again but is still a little hazy as the result.
