OCTOGENARIAN OF LAURA IS BURIED

Thos. Cummings, Sr., Laid to Rest; Came to Saskatchewan Fifteen Years Ago.

The following dispatch, taken from the Saskatoon Star of May 14, will be of interest to many old residents in and around Watford. Mr. Cummings was for many years a resident of this district, and moved to the West about fifteen years ago.

"A large crowd from Tessier and Laura gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Cummings, a few miles north of Tessier on Wednesday afternoon to attend the funeral of Thomas Cummings, Sr., who died on Tuesday morning at one o'clock. Mr. Cummings had reached the ripe age of 82 years and until comparatively a short time before his death enjoyed remarkable health. He lived in Laura until a few weeks ago when his son took up residence on his homestead to attend the spring work. The family were to return to Laura at the completion of the spring term. The service was conducted jointly by the pastors of Tessier and Laura, Revs. Andrew Walker and Phos. Curran.

"Mr. Curran voiced the sympathy of the large number of mourners present mentioning the various qualities which characterized the life of the departed as a friend and neighbor. Mr. Walker at the graveside gave a brief account of the last conversation he was privileged to have with the departed.

"The chief mourners were Herbert Cummings, Alsask; Tom Cummings, Laura; Lorne Cummings, Saskatoon; sons; Mrs. J. W. Wilson, Saskatoon; Mrs. F. Rogers, Laura; Mrs. G. Anderson, Birdview, granddaughters. Mrs. W. Parker of Carstairs, Alta., was prevented from attending through sickness. Mrs. John Hodgson jr., and Mrs. J. Hodgson, sr., both daughters, living at Regina, visited their father on Saturday and returned just before his death.

"The floral tributes were received from the family, and from Mr. and Mrs. C. Lawton, Tessier; Mrs. J. W. Parker and daughters; Knox Church, Tessier.

"The late Mr. Cummings was born at Orangeville, Ont., and came west in September 1909 settling at Tessier and residing there until his removal to Laura a few years ago."
