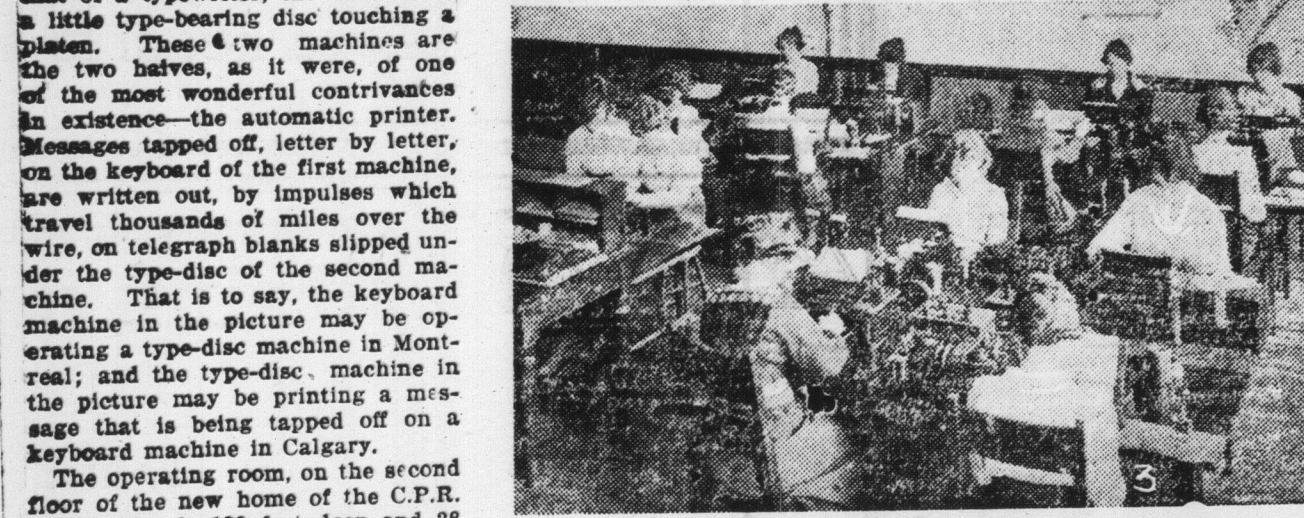
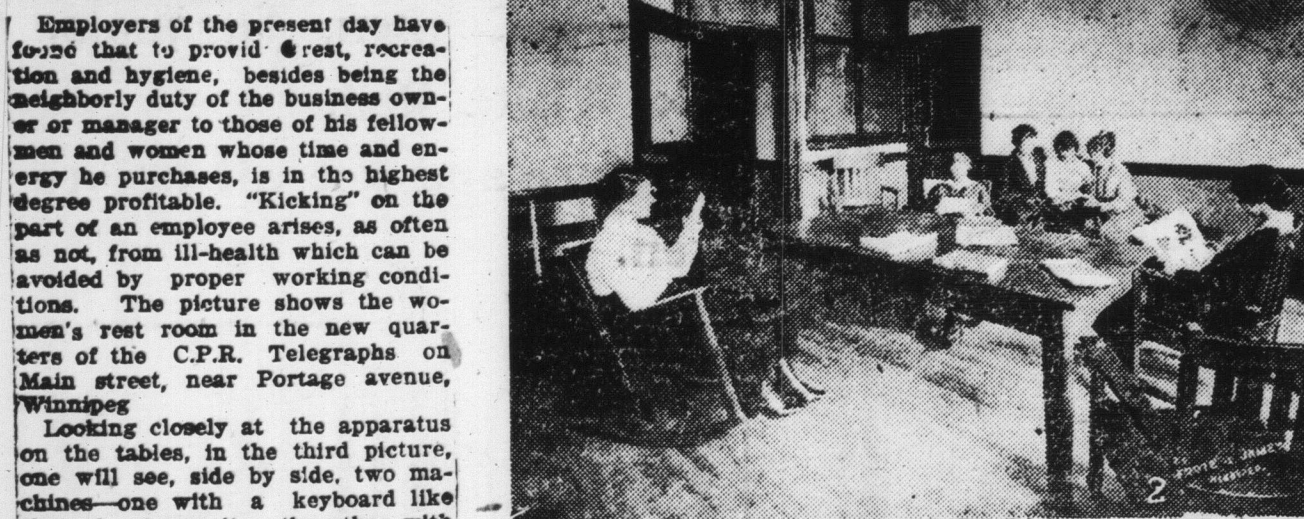

Modern Appliances in New Telegraph Work Rooms



Employers of the present day have
found that to provide rest, recrea-
tion and hygiene, besides being the
neighborly duty of the business own-
er or manager to those of his fellow-
men and women whose time and en-
ergy he purchases, is in the highest
degree profitable. "Kicking" on the
part of an employee arises, as often
as not, from ill-health which can be
avoided by proper working condi-
tions. The picture shows the work-
men's rest room in the new quar-
ters of the C.P.R. Telegraphs on
Main street, near Portage avenue,
Winnipeg.

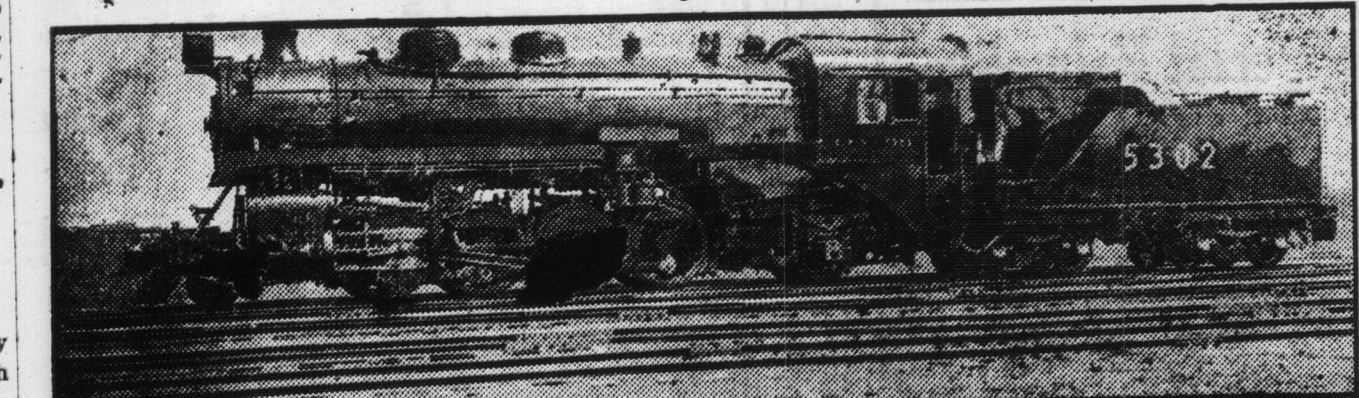
Looking closely at the apparatus
on the tables, in the third picture,
one will see, side by side, two ma-
chines—one with a keyboard like
that of a typewriter, the other with
a little type-bearing disc touching a
plate. These two machines are
the two halves, as it were, of one
of the most wonderful contrivances
in existence—the automatic printer.
Messages tapped off, letter by letter,
on the keyboard of the first machine,
are written out, by impulses which
travel thousands of miles over the
wire, on telegraph blanks slipped un-
der the type-disc of the second ma-
chine. That is to say, the keyboard
machine in the picture may be op-
erating a type-disc machine in Mon-
real; and the type-disc machine in
the picture may be printing a mes-
sage that is being tapped off on a
keyboard machine in Calgary.

The operating room, on the second
floor of the new home of the C.P.R.
Telegraphs, is 132 feet deep and 28
feet wide. Immense windows in two
tiers, the lower of clear glass and
the upper opaque, flood the apart-
ment with light by day; and by night,
a system of indirect lighting gives
ample illumination without glare.
At the back of the room can be

New Giant C.P.R. Locomotive



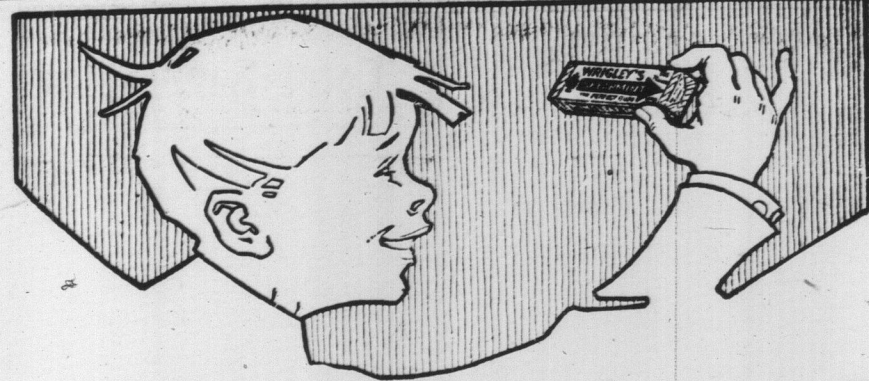
Ten of the largest locomotives ever
built for use on Canadian railways
have been under construction for
some time at the C.P.R. Angus Shops
in Montreal, and one of these, No.
5302, was inspected the other day by
President E. W. Beatty, and Vice-
President Grant Hall. These loco-
motives are of the heavy Mikado type
and are intended for freight service,
being designed and built under the
direct supervision of Mr. W. H. Win-
terrowd, the Chief Mechanical En-
gineer.

The weight of the engine and ten-
der in working condition is 500,000
lbs., the engine alone weighing 323,
000 lbs. The diameter of the driving
wheels is 43 inches. The cylinders
are 25 1/2 inches in diameter by 32-
inch stroke, which with 200-lbs. boiler
pressure makes these locomotives
capable of exerting a maximum
tractive effort of 36,000 lbs. The
diameter of the boiler is 80 inches at
the front end and 90 inches at the
back end. The fire box is 84 inches
wide and 120 inches long, and the
grates are moved by steam grate
shakers.

The cab is of the vestibule type,
which is the C.P.R. standard, and
every effort has been made to make
the accommodations for the engine-
men as comfortable as possible. One
side of the cab is fitted with a clothes
locker 14 inches by 20 inches wide,
in which clothes can be hung and
lunch pails carried.
