The rapidity and ease with which institutions from the Old World fit themselves into our organization afford a great encouragement to the advocates of this Scheme. Also, the inefficiency of the Sabbath schools as at present conducted to overtake the work allotted to them, renders it imperative upon the Church to try such a Scheme as this. But one can easily conceive of the possibility of such a fate as is implied in the words of Dr. Armstrong. Let Presby-teries pass judgment on it without giving it a fair trial; or let the Conveners of Presbyterial S. S. committees take no trouble to popularize it; let ministers refrain from presenting its claims to their congregations and Sabbath schools; let superintendents cling to their old time methods of conducting the schools; let the achools within a Preabytery remain in their present state of almost absolute isolation from each other, and we need not wait for the meeting of next General Assembly to ascertain the fate of the

Last, but not least, comes Mr. Farrie's objection. He asked—"Is it expected that those atudying for these examinations wil require help?" The answer "yes" was given.
