4) Compensation:

Research should be undertaken regarding Crown land resource rights compensation to identify the means of completing acquisition of the Canadian pristine areas system in a cost effective, yet just fashion.

5) Institutional Obstacles to Pristine areas:

A survey of federal government institutions should be undertaken on topics including: taxation, land ownership and resource rights allocation, and the legal system to determine where specific impediments to natural areas protection exist, with the aim of recommending reforms which could facilitate rather than impede societal land preservation needs.

6) Job Conversion:

Research should be undertaken to determine the implications of completing the pristine areas system and the means of offsetting employment impacts through job conversion strategies. Ideally such research should be undertaken with the employment sectors to be affected.

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7) Native Involvement:

Effort should be intensified to achieve more integration of the Native community into Canada's pristine areas program. Native management and co-management strategies, management skills training, as well as the co-operative identification and planning of prospective pristine areas sites should be pursued.

8) Interim Protection of Candidate Sites:

Interim protection should be considered essential in those locations of the country where development could preclude preservation options during the time when potential candidate sites are being evaluated. Means of most suitably providing such interim protection so as to minimize employment and economic dislocation should be investigated.

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
