I should like to say a word about the food and drugs committee of which I have been a member. I think the committee is doing valuable work and in my view Dr. Morrell and his staff are doing a wonderful job under somewhat trying circumstances. As a personal observation I would say that although the food and drug directorate is doing a very good job, it seems to me their efforts are not as widespread as they might be and are not reaching those who could have a direct effect on the economics of prescription drugs. I refer to the individual doctor, dentist, veterinarian or druggist. To this end I have suggested in the committee that some improvements in the labelling and grading of drugs be made and I hope these suggestions will be reflected in the committee's report and that the minister will take some action on

I was one of those who supported youth allowances. I understand that some parents are under the impression that the cheques will be sent directly to the children. I would ask the minister to make clear to the house exactly what the mechanics of the administration of youth allowances will be and whether the amounts payable will become part of the family allowance cheques or whether separate cheques will be sent to the young people individually. It seems to me that if these cheques are sent to the young people individually the administration of the allowances will cost a great deal more, and I certainly see no reason why they should be handled in this way.
