BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

Mr. McIlraith: Mr. Speaker, in accordance with the questions and answers in relation to the business of the house earlier today, the house leaders had a meeting to discuss the matters which were raised, and as a result came to an understanding that we would request the suspension of private members' hour and terminate the budget debate tomorrow.

Then on Monday and Tuesday we will proceed with legislation, and on Wednesday with redistribution.

[Mr. Speaker.]

I would accordingly ask unanimous consent of the house that the following be made an order of the house:

That, notwithstanding the provisions of any standing orders, this house orders that on Friday, 1966, the hour for private members business shall be suspended and at 5.45 o'clock p.m., unless the debate be previously concluded, Mr. Speaker shall interrupt the proceedings and forthwith put the question on the main motion "That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair" for the house to resolve itself into Committee of Ways and Means (Budget), and, if it be decided in the affirmative, the house shall forthwith resolve itself in Committee of Ways and Means.

I might say that there have been certain other understandings about certain speakers. In answer to the inquiry of the right hon. Leader of the Opposition about the business of the house, I should like to bring forward a more precise list tomorrow which would be in better form.

On one of the days we would take the resolution preceding the collective bargaining bill, and on the other day we would take the order respecting the construction of the Canadian National branch line, because they want to get ahead with the actual work on that.

Mr. Starr: What about the Ottawa terminal?

Mr. McIlraith: We should also deal with the measure to provide for the Science Council of Canada, and with the Research Council Act amendment. Then there is that hardy annual Combines Investigation Act. Then, the house would be in committee to provide for the development of commercial fisheries in Canada.

Mr. Starr: List everything.

Mr. McIlraith: We might also look at the first resolution on government orders of the day for today, which was the resolution to amend the Farm Credit Act, to increase the capital. I think that is one that commends itself particularly to farmers.

Mr. Starr: What about the Ottawa terminal bill?

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. Hon. members have heard the proposal put by the hon. Minister of Public Works that there be suspension of private members' hour tomorrow afternoon and also that the question now before the house be put at 5.45 p.m. Is this an order of the house?
