### MODIFICATION OF WHITE PAPER

Hon. Robert L. Stanfield (Leader of the Opposition): I wish to ask the Prime Minister what is to be the scope of the supplementary white paper on taxation that the Minister of Finance has referred to? Is this supplementary white paper to be confined to certain aspects of capital gains taxation or is it to include other aspects of taxation as well?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): I have not heard of the supplementary white paper, Mr. Speaker. I will confer with the minister.

Mr. Stanfield: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. I seriously direct this question to the Prime Minister, the head of the government, in the assumption that the Minister of Finance alone does not decide the taxation policy of the government. Has the government itself decided upon modification of the position set forth in the white paper?

Mr. Trudeau: Not yet, Mr. Speaker. We have published the white paper and we have told the Canadian public that we are going to wait for representations from them. Until we have heard from all interested parties, those who want to make presentations, we are not going to revise the white paper.

Mr. Stanfield: A further supplementary, Mr. Speaker. Are we entitled to assume, therefore, from what the Prime Minister has said that the indication by the Minister of Finance is correct and that a supplementary white paper will be presented or a supplementary paper will be presented with modifi-cations? I ask the Prime Minister whether this is necessarily so, and has any such decision yet been made by the government of this country?

Mr. Trudeau: Quite to the contrary. When we published the white paper it was the government's position that we were doing it in order to hear representations and, if necessary, to modify our views on certain points. [Mrs. MacInnis.]

Minister. Can the right hon, gentleman say This is the purpose of a white paper, so that when we may expect the report of the Royal it can be discussed before being put into legislative form. We intend to do this.
