Hon. Warren Allmand (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Mr. Speaker, these rates which were announced yesterday by the NCPC were given notice of one year ago. What is being done at the present time is that the rates have been referred to the AIB for examination and also within our department the former minister set up a task force to examine them to see what sort of relief might be given. I expect to get their report next week.

Mr. Clark: A supplementary question. I should like, first of all, to have a guarantee from the minister that once the task force reports, its recommendations will be made available to the House of Commons forthwith and not hidden, as has happened with so many reports made available to this government. I should like also to ask the minister whether, in light of the recurrent problems involved in NCPC and the recurrent unfairness to the people of the north, the government will consider making changes in the legislation regarding the NCPC, in particular whether they will amend section 10 of the act which requires a self-sustaining capacity for NCPC?

Mr. Allmand: Mr. Speaker, in examining the task force report, which I hope to get next week, that suggestion will be examined as well.

ANTI-INFLATION PROGRAM

REQUEST FOR ACTION TO STOP PRICE INCREASES IMPOSED ON RESIDENTS OF NORTHERN CANADA

Mr. Joe Clark (Leader of the Opposition): A final supplementary for the Prime Minister, Mr. Speaker. We understand from the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development that there has been a reference of this matter to the Anti-Inflation Board. That simply draws attention to the inconsistency of the government's approach whereby on the one hand they have been using the Anti-Inflation Board to restrict increases in wages of people in northern Canada while through another agency they are pushing through the system and imposing upon consumers in that region extravagant power rate increases. Will the Prime Minister give the House a guarantee now that action will be taken by his government to change that situation, where unfair increases are imposed upon consumers in northern Canada?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, the hon. member refers to the AIB action as regards wages but seems to neglect the fact that they also act on prices and that the Consumer Price Index is considerably lower—almost half the rate it was last year.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

NORTHERN CANADA POWER COMMISSION

PROPOSED INQUIRY INTO OPERATIONS OF COMMISSION— REPORT OF TASK FORCE ON COST OVER-RUNS ON AISHAK AND STRUTT LAKE PROJECTS

Mr. Doug Neil (Moose Jaw): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. In view of the fact that northerners will pay from 12 cents to 15 cents per kilowatt or nearly four times the price paid by people in the south for electricity, will the minister grant the demands of many northern Canadians and initiate a fully fledged, exhaustive public inquiry into the operations of NCPC?

Hon. Warren Allmand (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Mr. Speaker, I think I would want to consider all these suggestions when I consider the report of the task force next week.

The minister refers to the task force and I understand there is also a task force set up to investigate the over-runs of costs in the Aishak and Strutt Lake projects. I wonder if he has received that report and if so would he table it? If he has not received it would he undertake to table it as soon as it is received?

Mr. Allmand: Mr. Speaker, I cannot recall receiving it but I will look into the suggestion.

UNEMPLOYMENT—EFFECT OF JOB CREATION PROGRAM DURING FIRST HALF OF 1977
