March 8th, 1926. T. F. Traihey, Esq., Secretary, Harbour Commission, Montreal. My dear Mr. Trainey: -I am giving this letter to Mr. Edward McArthy, with whom I have just had a conversation. Mr. McArthy served with the 87th Battalion and was very badly wounded the day we broke the Queant-Drocourt line. He was pensioned and up to about seventeen months ago was rated as fully disabled. Since that time his pension has been very greatly reduced. He has been employed by the Harbour Commission at different intervals, - taken on lest summer he was laid off last November, and taken on again about January 10th he was laid off about February 24th. His Superintendent was Mr. Sherry, with whom I have spoken over the 'phone. Mr. Sherry sayd that Mr. McArthy is a first class work man and that he would gladly have him as a member of his staff. I would regard it as a personal favour if you could see your way clear to give this very worthy ex-soldier congenial employment. I may say that Mr. McArthy has held very good positions in the days before the war
