CHURCH OF ST. MARY THE VIRGIN. The past year, has been a red-letter one for the Church of St. Mary the Virgin. During the year the property to the south of the present church (on the corner of Bloor street and Delaware avenue), on which it had been intended to erect a new church, was found to be unsuitable for the purpose and was disposed of for \$35,500, and a new site, facing Northum-berland street, on Westmoreland avenue, with residence thereon suitable for rec-tory, was purchased at a cost of about \$19,000, the exchange of sites leaving a balance toward the new church buildings of about \$16,500. In addition to this, the present church buildings and the rectory on Delaware avenue may be offered for sale at an early date; estimated value, \$30,000. It is proposed to erect on the new site a church costing about \$50,000, contracts for \$20,000 having already been awarded and operations commenced. During the year subscriptions to the building fund to the extent of \$9856 were received, and also the wardens were able to apply over \$1200 of current revenue to the building account. 


