Great Britain Cites Doctrine of Lincoln in Reply to Washington Protest.

SEARCH SHIPS IN PORT

Change in Size of Vessels Does Not Permit Examination at Sea.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 .- Secretary Bryan late this afternoon announced the receipt of a note from Great Britain replying to the U.S. communication of December 26, respecting American commerce. The note, which is about the same

length as the American communica-tion will be made public on Sunday afternoon by mutual agreement be tween the state department and the British foreign office.

The British communication is in conclusive in many respects and will lead to a further exchange of notes While the communication points out the peculiar necessities of belliberent phrased in a spirit of frankness and friendliness.
