### CITY AND MCGILL IN QUITE FRIENDLY CONFAB

But Differences Respecting Rounded Corners and Freight Yards Are Still Unadjusted.

There were two conferences between the board of control and D. McNeill, vice-president and general manager of the C. P. R., yesterday. One was on the question of rounding the southeast corner of King and Yonge streets by the expropriation of 40 feet of the company's property, by the city.

### MRS MEYERS PLEADS FOR BRIDGE AT SUNNYSIDE

As Largest Property Owner Affected She Opposes Plan of City Council.

"I always knew the commission was honest and straightforward," said Mrs. P. V. Meyers, after a discussion by the Dominion Railway Board yesterday afternoon regarding the construction of a bridge over the tracks at Sunnyside in lieu of the proposed subway at the extension of Keele-street. It was a matter of pro and con, and to give the city an opportunity to deal with the property owners affected, an adjournment was taken until May 16.

**No Gates for Death Trap**  
The board refused an order regarding gates at Sherman-avenue, Hamilton, where a man was recently killed. About one thousand persons use the crossing a day, but the traffic at night is light, and the board did not consider the protection necessary at the time.
