OLD JIM M'GUIRE, CATCHER PLAYING BALL 22 YEARS

Was With Toronto in 1889—One President Who Advocates Rowdiness—Gossip.

Old Jim McGuire, who was with Toronto in 1889, soon graduated to the big league, where he still works with the New York Highlanders. Seventeen years ago the Toronto played over the Don and were in the International Association, finishing fifth. Detroit won the pennant, followed by Syracuse, Rochester and Toledo, London, Buffalo and Hamilton went to behind Toronto. Toronto was McGuire's primary companion. Old Jim is now brought to mind from the fact that on Saturday at New York, before 7000 fans saw Detroit start in to beat the team, he occupied the bench, Umpire Silk O'Loughlin made a presentation of a diamond locket to McGuire, the veteran of 22 years' service on the diamond. The locket contains a \$225 bond and the following inscription:

Presented to James T. McGuire by the New York Fans as a token of esteem and appreciation for years of faithful service. July 21, 1906.

All the players of both teams gathered around the catcher, who was placed as usual in the diamond, and the fans as the catcher received the locket.
