ST. THOMAS MAN KILLED BY DETROIT POLICEMAN

Friends Not Satisfied With Self-Defence Plea.

DETROIT, April 19.—It was learned today that Edward Brown, the young Detroit man who was shot and killed by a police officer here early on Wednesday morning, was a native of St. Thomas. He removed with his parents from St. Thomas to Detroit ten years ago.

At the inquest today the coroner's jury held that the patrolman had acted in self-defence in shooting Brown, who, he declared, had attacked him, but friends of the Canadian are not satisfied with the verdict and will seek to have Edward Duds, the officer, indicted on a murder charge. Brown was 23 years old and the sole support of his mother.

MINERS OF COBALT SEEK NEW WAGE SCALE

96 Per Cent in Favor—Will Come Up at Convention Soon.

COBALT, April 19.—With the exception of returns from Shotta, which does not amount to more than 20 votes, the ballot cast by the miners' union of this district has resulted in a majority of about 96 per cent in favor of adopting the wage scale as drawn up a few weeks ago.

It is understood that nothing of a concrete nature will be done until the committee at the various camps discuss the matter, and that probably at the annual convention on May 7 it will be decided to submit a copy of the new scale to the various mine managers, together with a request for a conference between managers and employees. The scale will also be submitted to Ottawa and to the trades and labor congress.

NO RUSSIAN SOCIALISTS AT COPENHAGEN CONGRESS

PETROGRAD, via London, April 20.—With reference to the Copenhagen reports of a Russo-German Socialist congress at Copenhagen, the executive committee of the council of workers' and soldiers' delegates, in which all the authorized delegates are represented, has issued a statement to state that the council has decided to abstain from such a congress, and that none of the Russian Socialist parties has sent delegates thereto.

INGERSOLL PINSPILLERS LOSE TO TILLSONBURG

INGERSOLL, April 19.—After having defeated St. Thomas and Woodstock bowlers recently, the locals went down to defeat at Tillsonburg last night. The total scores rolled were as follows: Ingersoll, 2,306; Tillsonburg, 2,553.

The Ingersoll Bowling Club have had a successful week, the local competition having been keen. Tomorrow night the return game with the Tillsonburg team will be played, and the locals are hopeful of retrieving their reputation.

U. S. CERTIFICATES ON SALE

NEW YORK, April 19.—The New York Federal Reserve Bank was instructed today by the treasury department to receive subscriptions for the anticipated loan of \$2,000,000,000 of Government 2 1/2 per cent certificates of indebtedness to be used for making funds available for the Allies.

MUNITION WORKERS, MALE AND FEMALE, STRIKE IN BERLIN

Deputation Is Sent to Hollweg—To Report Back Today.

AMSTERDAM, via London, April 20.—The Berlin Vorwaerts, a copy of which has been received here, says the male and female workers of the Deutsche Waffen und Munitions Fabrik of Berlin decided Wednesday after three hours of lively debate not to resume work, but to send a deputation to Dr. von Bernmann-Holweg, the imperial chancellor. The result of the interview with the chancellor was to have been communicated to the meeting of the workers which was fixed for today.

The Cologne Gazette reports various strikes in Leipzig. It says also that a large meeting was held at Stotteritz, Saxony, for a discussion of the scarcity of food, and that after the meeting the participants marched in procession through the town. The newspaper does not state whether munition workers took part in the demonstration or whether work was resumed.

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT IS AGAIN DEBATED IN CANADIAN PARLIAMENT

No Conclusion Reached—Sir Wilfrid Would Like Women Exempted.

OTTAWA, April 19.—Shall Canada continue to require life for life or shall there be abolition of capital punishment? This question, which is before Parliament each session, was again debated today upon the resolution of Mr. Bickelike for the abolition of capital punishment. As has been the case in past years no conclusion was reached; the debate was adjourned, and hanging is still a legal form of punishment for Canadian murder.

Mr. Bickelike drew the attention of Parliament to the fact that since the adjournment Russia has abolished capital punishment.
