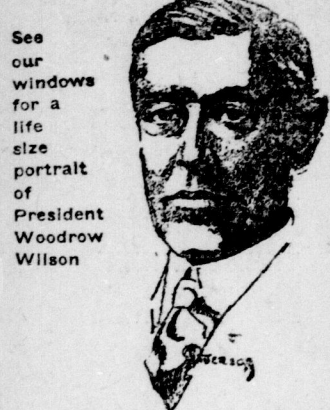

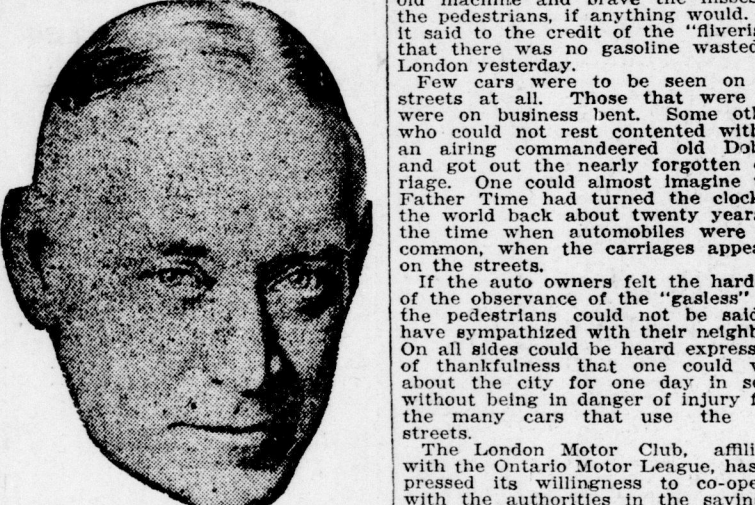

tian Association in Toronto.

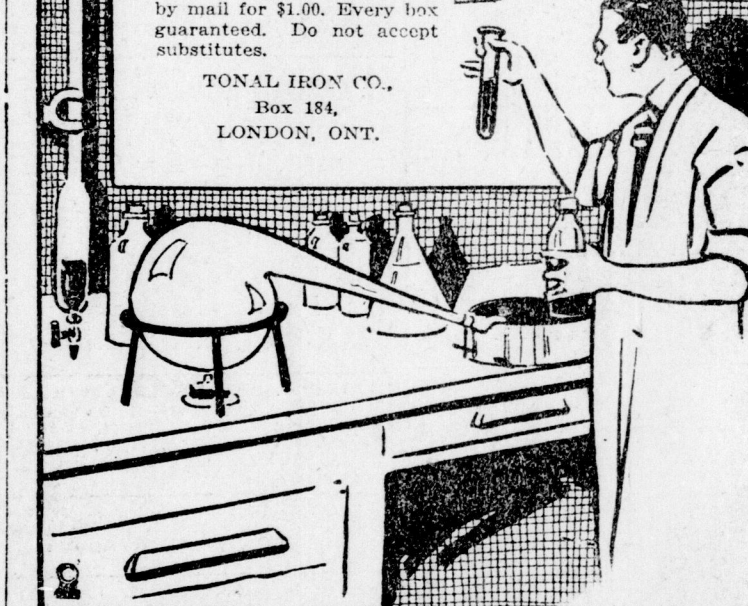
**KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

**LAST BAND CONCERT  
OF SEASON GIVEN  
IN VICTORIA PARK**  
Under the auspices of the Adelphe  
Chapter, I. O. O. E., the last band  
concert of the season was given in  
Victoria Park by the Canadian Garri-  
son Regiment band on Sunday even-  
ing. The proceeds, \$55.50, will be  
devoted to the patriotic work of the  
chapter. This chapter, which was only  
formed recently, is composed of young  
fellows, and this is the first money re-  
ceived from the public with which to  
carry on their work. Considerable Red  
Cross work has already been done by  
this chapter, with materials that have  
been donated to it by older chapters  
of the I. O. O. E. It is proposed that  
if any more band concerts are to be  
held, they will be held in the armie-  
ries.

**FIRE BREAKS OUT ON  
STREET CAR, CAUSING  
DAMAGE OF \$300**  
A spectacular fire occurred at 5 o'clock  
Sunday, when a Richmond street  
car, No. 70, in charge of Motorman H.  
Banghart and Conductor R. A. Young,  
burst into flames at High street and  
McClary avenue. The car was proceed-  
ing south, when the front end was seen  
to be afire. It was stopped, the fire  
department was called, and the blaze  
extinguished with chemicals. The street  
railway officials estimate their damage  
at \$300. The flooring in the front was  
badly burned, besides the front seat and  
all the varnish, and the motor will need  
a lot of repairs. Luckily there were  
few passengers aboard, hence no panic  
ensued and no one was injured.

**McADOO AWARD GIVES  
ONE GROUP OF EMPLOYEES  
AN INCREASE OF \$6,000**  
Six thousand dollars per month has  
been added to the pay envelopes of the  
station employees of the G. T. R. in  
the London division as a result of the  
McAdoo award. This represents in-  
creases of from 10 to 43 per cent, being  
an average increase of 26 1/2 per cent.  
Telegraphers are not included in this,  
as no definite announcement has been  
received at the offices here that their  
status under the award has been estab-  
lished.  
The clerks employed at the various  
stations will receive \$1,500 of this sum,  
while the baggage-men, porters, checkers  
and dispatchers will divide the sum  
of \$1,200 extra between them monthly.  
The remaining \$3,300 will be apportioned  
among the maintenance of way em-  
ployees, dammen, switchmen and police-  
men. Trainmen and yardmen are yet  
awaiting decision as to what their rate  
of increase will be under the award.
