Two hundred thousand of these children not only had neither fathers nor mothers, but not even a single known surviving relative. Nobody knew who they were or what sufferings they had endured. For weeks and months many of them lived solely on boiled grass, thistles and lettuce, and so emaclated had they become that sores developed who they become that sores developed who they were or being seemed to portrude through the fleshless skin. Their only clothing was rags wound around their shrunken. hunger-shrivelled forms. Twenty-five per cent of them are tubercular.

"I've heard that France won it, that France won it, that Italy won it, and that Lloyd George won it. Only the other day I heard that Sam Hughes won it. And no one man did much more than Sam Hughes to win it. I'm not saying that for political reasons, because until a week or two weeks ago, I didn't know whether Sam Hughes was a Grit or a Tory. But I want to say that the British Empire soldier won the war."

Something of the psychological contrasts in the temperament of the soldier was illustrated by a little story. A battalion had brawed for many days the hardships and the sacrifices of the front line without voicing a single complaint. Back in the rest billets, at teatime, an incipient riot was threatened. "A fat-headed A. S. C. man forgot the sugar," explained the colonel in command. "Bolshevism is the grayest danger to

command.

"Boishevism is the gravest danger to the average worker that any country has ever experienced," said General Davey, expressing the hope that the blood-red revolution that prevailed in Russia would never endanger the British Empire.
