of Lord Burnham for governor-general of Canada has emanated solely from the busy brain of Lord Northcliffe is the general opinion at Ottawa. From what can be ascertained, the suggestion has no official authorization, and is backed by no considerable body of public opinion in the Dominion. Nor, it may be said, would the chances of Lord Burnham's securing the appointment be improved (providing he were considered) by the fact that Lord Northcliffe is endeavoring to influence the situation. Canada will undoubtedly be consulted in the matter.

Came Four Years Age.

The present governor-general, the Duke of Devonshire, came to Canada in November of 1916. His term does not expire until November, 1921, and he is sufficiently a lover of Canada to remain until his term is up. That the affection is reciprocated is well known, for no governor-general has ever represented the crown with less friction than has his excellency. He is a man of democratic spirit, fond of Canadan institutions, diplomatic in his dealings and of a cordial manner. There are those who believe Canada might do worse than extend his term of office for a couple of years, until normal times return and Canada's new status is more clearly defined.

Several names, however, are mentioned for his successor, among them being those of Lord Byng, of Vimy, who commanded the Canadian troops for a time; the Earl of Athlone, formerly Prince Alexander of Teck; the Duke of Agyle, and others. At the close of today's hearing Chairman Penrose intimated that he desired fuller enlightenment as to the danger of retaliation from other countries. The committee will conclude its hearings tomorrow, and the bill is to be taken up in executive session on Friday.

This, he added, was merely an indication of how the retaliation might start, and he explained that there were many other commodities which could be incompanied.
