Nineteen-Year-Old Frenchmen Are Now Called to Register

Orders have been received by the consul-general for France to invite all Frenchmen born in 1898, and those omitted from preceding classes, to ask for their inscription on the lists of the class 1918 in which the care of the class 1918, in which they are to be in-

class 1918, in which they are to be in-corporated. The documents necessary for this inscription will be supplied to them upon request by the French consul in Toronto, which documents must be returned to the consul's office before the 15th day of February, 1917, in or-der that they may be presented in France on the 15th day of Mcrch, 1917. Those who consider themselves en-titled to exemption must furnish a titled to exemption must furnish a medical cartificate stating in what state of health they are, with full de-tails and precision as to fitness or unfitness for military service. Men-tion must also be made as to size, weight, and power of eyesight. Those suspended from previous classes are also subject to the same should be attended to without delay in order to regularize their military situ-

MUST COMPLETE CASE.


