RUSS SUB CAPTURES TURKISH TRANSPORT

Six Thousand Ton Armed Vessel Taken to Sebastopol.

FOUGHT FOR AN HOUR

Transport, Under German Command, is Damaged in Battle.

Patronized, Oct. 15.—The Russian submarine Tulon on Oct. 15 after an engagement near the Bosphorus, captured the Turkish 600-ton armed transport Roditso, says the Russian official statement. The transport, which was commanded by German officers, was taken to Sebastopol. The submarine Tulon, under command of Lieut. Commander Klytinn, captured near the Bosphorus, after an hour's unequal artillery engagement, the Turkish armed transport of 600 tons displacement. The transport was under command of German officers and despite the damage which it sustained during the engagement, was safely escorted to Sebastopol. The transport captured was named the Roditso.

of the petrol supply, on which the Germans depend for the maintenance of their armies. Thus the political value of Roumania's intervention is really much greater than the military value.

It will probably be found that the notion that Germany was going to overrun Roumania as she had Bulgaria overran Serbia is a delusion. The Roumanians have now reached the positions which they seized and prepared on the Austrian side of the frontier to secure their border from invasion, and at this time these positions have probably been made too formidable for rapid capture.

One factor that also led to the disaster to Serbia a year ago was her deficiency of heavy guns. If she could have had only a few powerful batteries, in the estimate of artillery experts, the Germans and Austrians would never have been able to cross the Danube and capture Belgrade. In the case of Roumania, she made her decision to enter the war on the side of Italy when Italy joined the allies, and she has laid in an immense store of ammunition and a great quantity of heavy artillery. The Carpathian front is also Alpine in its character, comparatively easy to hold, and in a few weeks the coming of winter, arctic in its severity, will stop military movements from Transylvania.

The latest fighting in France has brought the British considerable gains and 202 prisoners in the area of the Stiff and Schwaben Redoubts, involving a considerable advance. The British also improved their positions by slightly advancing north of Gueudecourt. The French, south of the Somme, won a considerable success by carrying a mile and a quarter of German trenches, the Hamlet of Gernemont and the sugar refinery, about two-thirds of a mile northwest of Ablaincourt. German counter-attacks against these important positions could do nothing against the defence. The gains were kept and consolidated. The present operations are merely preparatory work, preparatory to the launching of another general attack. The war will shortly be carried beyond Thierval and Peronne to the great railway junction of Cambrai and St. Quentin. Once the allies get near those points, and their rate of progress is about to be greatly accelerated, the Germans will have to clear out of their present front and retire eastward towards home.

North of Saloniki the Serbians have advanced on the left bank of the Corna. A French cavalry division, covering the railway line south of Serres and British patrols have come in contact with the enemy in the region of Serres and their artillery has shelled Hristos, the Seres station and Barakli Juma. Bulgarian communications on the Dolna front were cut. The Germans claim that heavy allied attacks west of the Florina-Monastir railway were shelled.

The Italians have spent the past two days in enlarging and strengthening their captured positions in the Julian Alps, in the direction of Trieste. They also increased their gains southwest of Gorizia. In the Piasubio sector they also advanced towards Mount Bolte, in the direction of Trent.

Russian troops fought a battle north of Korythina, in Volhynia, and stormed German outposts. They captured two machine guns and they took a number of prisoners. The fighting was stubborn while it lasted.
